Yale Favorite in Coming Tiger Game

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—(United News)—Despite the excellent showing made by Princeton in the game with Harvard at Palmer stadium last Saturday Yale is favored in Wall street betting to defeat the tigers at New Haven on Nov. 14. Odds of 9 to 5 were offered Tuesday on an Eli victory over Princeton. One firm of betting commissioners had \$25,000 on hand to be wagered at those odds. Yale also has been made a pronounced favorite in "future" betting on the Harvard game the following week. The big gamblers are offering 2 1/2 to 1 that the blue defeats the crimson. The army is rated at 3 to 1 favorite to defeat Columbia next Saturday, while odds of 6 to 5 are offered on Brown against Harvard. The Colgate-Syracuse game is considered an even money proposition. Dartmouth will go west for the Chicago game, a 7 to 5 favorite over Coach Stagg's team, while Pennsylvania is favored to beat Pittsburgh at odds of 8 to 5. With the 1925 season drawing to a close and attention of football fans focusing on the remaining big games, Wall street betting commissioners report increasingly long wagers.

Reserve Air Force Paper Organization

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The Mitchell court martial trial has disclosed that the reserve air service, an organization counted upon strongly as an adjunct to the regular air force, is a paper organization, that the national guard air force in the 15 states maintaining it is insufficiently equipped and that what planes it has are obsolete. Witnesses united Tuesday in blaming the condition of the nation's air forces upon a false economy, but they admitted it only under goading of members of the court. Congress, they testified must stand the responsibility for the lack of funds which they said had not only handicapped the service but broken it down to a point where it is nearly impotent as an auxiliary defense. It is possible that from this testimony the war department may be able to build up a demand for more appropriations from congress this winter.

Bad Language Brings Jail, Fine

Everett Lynch yesterday learned, to his sorrow, that free speech does not include the use of indecent language in the presence of women. For 10 days, while he remains in the county jail, he will have the opportunity to regret his alleged improper observations on the public highway near the Beatty store. In addition to the ten days' sentence, Lynch was ordered by Justice of the Peace Kendall to pay a fine of \$25. And even that is not all. Lynch, along with a man who gave his name as Alvin Willis, is charged with the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. To that accusation he and Willis entered pleas of not guilty. Their cases, Kendall said, will be heard the early part of next week.

(Continued from Page One) licitors or prominent traders were caught. Today's sales of 3,427,000 shares exceeds the previous record of 3,281,000 shares established 24 years ago. It was just before the Northern Pacific corner that the latter turnover was achieved, on April 30, 1901. It was 30 minutes after the market closed before those caught in the decline knew the worst, for the ticket tape ran that far behind the sales made on the floor of the exchange. There was no one to rescue the small investors as the wave of sales engulfed them, nor was there any sign of resistance to the bear movement. The market probably was weakest at the close. So were the brokers, many of whom limped off the floor with marks of combat upon them. And so were the small investors, who had been taught once more the lesson of Wall street.

STORM WARNING OUT

PORTLAND, Nov. 10.—Storm warnings were continued along the Oregon and Washington coast Tuesday night in anticipation of further heavy gales in addition to the disturbance that has held sway off the Columbia river since Monday morning. Although the 64 miles coast gale of Monday afternoon and night had passed by and the wind velocity had dropped to 42 miles from the south Tuesday night, more gales were in prospect before Wednesday morning, according to weather bureau records. The storm brought rain inland and a general fall was experienced in the Willamette valley.
