Sports Done Brown

The appointment of Dwight Davis, internationally known tennis enthusiast and booster, as secretary of war by President Coolidge is of unusual interest to sport fans in general and close followers of the tennis game in particular.

It is generally known, of course, that Davis is the man who donated the Davis cup, the most prized trophy in the tennis world, to promote international competition. Play for this bit of silverware has produced the most brilliant chapters in tennis history. It undoubtedly is a matter of personal pride to Davis that America has kept possession of the cup most of the time.

Davis, in his days as an active tourney player, was one of the best left-handed players in the game. Any student of the game will tell you that a "southpaw" makes a difficult opponent when he is good.

Davis goes into the ranks of the cabinet members at the age of 46. He is the youngest member of the cabinet and in general appearance which speaks of robust health and vigor—seems to be just at the beginning of his political career—if he chooses to pursue such a career.

Columbia University's football team can do some very valuable missionary work in the east the rest of this hectic season.

The team went west the other day to take on Ohio State university. Now, apparently, the football writers of New York and environs had forgotten about Chick Harley and a few other great stars Ohio once boasted. Anyhow, they gave the Columbian team a good sendoff by announcing that it was departing to meet a "team of which little is known."

Ohio State may still be little known in New York but Columbia received a beautiful lesson in forceful football. Coach Wilce's men played rings around the eastern team, out-passing it, out-running it, and putting up a more serious brand of football.

Notre Dame may still have its Four Horsemen, but they must be riding Shetland ponies. Any thoroughbred horses, skillfully ridden, ought to out-class and out-general a mule. But the Army Mule gave the 1925 act of the Four Horsemen the horse laugh.

The unfortunate accident during the Washington and Jefferson-Carnegie Tech game bespeaks one great benefit that the erection of giant concrete stadiums is working—the elimination of hazards to the spectators. This benefit might well offset many of the minor objections to such modern stands—due to the very nature of them.

Harvard and Princeton may well be joyful, for a few days at least, thanks to the victory of Pennsylvania over the Yale bulldog. That victory gives the Crimson and the Tiger the feeling that Yale can be beaten—which feeling has been stepped upon in past seasons.
