man husk. At about this same time when Dr. Blazer was left alone with his burden, he lost nearly all of his money in a business deal. The future looked dark.

Last February 24, while Frances Bishop and her husband were shopping in Denver, Dr. Blazer snuffed Hazel's spark of life out with chloroform and then slashed his own throat and placed the chloroform mask over his own face. But the doctor was not as successful in the attempt on his own life as he had been in the one of Hazel's. When the Bishops returned to Littleton they found Hazel's body and the doctor. The latter was stupid but he was taken to a hospital where he recovered only to be indicted for one of the most unusual crimes ever committed.

In the bedroom where the drama had enacted was found a note in Dr. Blazer's hand writing. It said he was growing old, had hardening of the arteries, and feared he was to be "taken" at any time leaving Hazel to the care of unwilling hands. This suicide note was read into the court record to substantiate the claim that Dr. Blazer was in-

The court said that had he known the sentiment in the jury room was so overwhelmingly in favor of the doctor he would have dismissed the jury much earlier. He said that in his own mind there was a reasonable doubt as to Dr. Blazer's guilt.

In moving that the charge be dismissed, Prosecutor Stone said he believed the trial had been fair, and that he had "no desire to persecute a man merely because he had committed a crime."

Nation-wide attention was attracted to Blazer's case because it raised the hypothetical question of a physician's right to take the life of a hopelessly imbecilic and deformed human. Although the defense emphasized its claim that Dr. Blazer committed the act last February 24, while temporarily insane, the emotional appeal played an important part in the trial.

The girl, Hazel, almost since infancy, had been a hopeless idiot. An attack of meningitis left her with the limbs of a baby. She had no control of her muscles, never learned to speak, and it was doubtful that she could hear.

Dr. Blazer planned to commit suicide after chloroforming Hazel, but he was given medical aid and recovered. He left a suicide note, saying he had decided it was best for society and for Hazel that the
