Postmaster Says Stories of Ducks Ill From Some Kind of Germ Just Bunk, Holds Gunshot Wounds Responsible

"Just bunk." So the numerous stories and Hurd and his friends ate birds every day, and the only ill-effects suffered were from over-eating. "The sportsmen of the west should take action to flood the lake. That in itself would give the wounded birds a chance to recover to say nothing of what it would furnish in the way of breeding grounds," said Hurd. Hurd is prominent in sporting circles. He has been in the legislature and on committees having to do with fish and game. Local sportsmen believe the bag of Hurd and his party to have been the finest seen in Klamath Falls for several years. Three machines were loaded with 140 ducks and 110 geese. Others with Hurd were E. S. Prooty and Arthur E. Abbott of Seaside, and Wm. Jones, Fred Reed and Jake Boshart of Warrenton. They all looked healthy, poison or not. Theories of duck poisoning in Klamath country were characterized yesterday by E. N. Hurd, postmaster at Seaside. Hurd as a member of a party of six hunters, all of whom got the limit, had just returned from a week's shooting on Tule lake. "This country has been injured by the stories of sick ducks. There are no sick birds and there are no poisoned birds. But there are thousands of wounded and injured birds," said Hurd. "There is no poison other than shot poison." Hurd explained that owing to the condition of the duck grounds, due to lack of water, that thousands of ducks are lost to hunters. He estimated that at least one-quarter of the wounded birds were lost, for unless a bird was dropped close to the spot that it was impossible to recover in the heavy vine grass and tules, he said.

"Hmmm," she observed, when she was arraigned in justice court yesterday on a charge of having to do with liquor law violation. "Of the things which I ain't gettin' considerable of—in fact, none whichever—is justice in this court." She paused. Then, by way of variety, she said, "Hmmm." She hesitated again. But not for long. Her theme held her. "I ain't the

recipient of no justice, nor scarcely not much of no similarity," she said, in effect.

NAVY PERSONNEL TO BE LESSENED

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Nov. 14.—A material reduction of the enlisted personnel of the American navy, on account of a shortage of funds, and which will place all destroyers of the fleet on a 90 per cent crew complement has been announced by Rear Admiral William Shoemaker in a dispatch received at the naval headquarters here tonight. A deficiency of more than 1400 petty officers on the naval force is now existing, while the number of chief petty officers in the service is reported to be equal to the official requirements. During the balance of the fiscal year not more than 9500 recruits will be received in the navy, which will bring down the personnel from the full strength of 86,000 men to less than 81,700. On June 30, 1925, the strength of the American fleets was 84,285 men, and on October 24, it had fallen to 81,405 men. A request for a deficiency appropriation to permit the navy to bring the force to full quota, has been made and will be presented to congress this fall, Admiral Shoemaker's report stated.
