BRITISH SUB LOST WITH CREW OF 60

LONDON, Nov. 14.—United News—The submarine M-1 has been given up for lost with all hands. Her crew numbered 60 men.

Sir Henry Oliver, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, wirelessly all units of his command Thursday night as follows:

"I regret to inform the fleet that it appears that the submarine M-1 has been lost with all hands during the exercises in the channel."

The M-1 was reported missing by the admiralty Thursday.

The M-1 was a member of the submarine flotilla which sailed for Gibraltar Monday. It is assumed that the admiralty that the flotilla was halted off the Isle of Wight by bad weather and started some maneuvers while waiting. The M-1 belongs to the monitor class, and formerly was known as the K-18. She is 294 feet long, burned oil, mounted a 12-inch gun, a 3-inch gun, a Lewis machine gun and four 18-inch torpedo tubes.

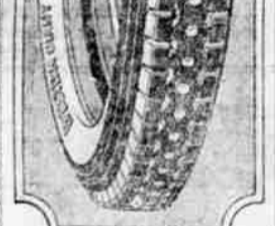

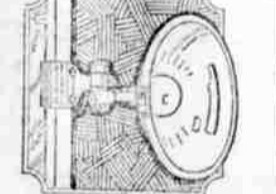
