William Howard Taft, ex-president of the United States, and yet one of the most prominent figures in current history, was the first judge of the first court of honor, to be instituted into the order of the Boy Scouts of America.

Other prominent men serve as judges of the court and consider it one of the greatest of honors to be asked to sit on such a bench.

Klamath Falls has her own court of honor. D. V. Kaykendall is the presiding judge, and the court commissioners are E. L. Elliott, E. B. Hall, James Swanson, Dr. G. A. Massey, Arthur L. Rice and L. E. Banker. The clerk of the court is Everett O. Nord, court herald is Paul O. Landry.

The court will convene once every six weeks, the time to be announced a week before the meeting in Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt's court room.

The court of honor is the organization through which Klamath Falls will show its approval of scouts who have made progress. Its primary purpose is to encourage and stimulate boys in advancement in scouting, and to standardize the work of rewarding their efforts.

While scouting is much more than the mere passing of tests, it has been found that boys advance consistently from rank to rank exemplify scout principles in the best possible manner. Scout progress and true scout spirit are directly connected. Heretofore the awarding of certificates and badges has been done in a more formal way and without opportunity to impress upon the boy the importance of the occasion.

It is now proposed by the court of honor that the presence of outstanding men of the community will dignify the occasion and place the stamp of approval of the community upon the boy's work and advancement. This work will not only encourage the boy, but the scoutmaster and the troop officers, who have spent their days with the boy

in helping him to advance. The ritual will be simple but formal. Court of honor will meet Wednesday, with boys gathering at 7 p. m. in the American Legion rooms with the court convening at 8 o'clock in the court room.

CRIME IS LAID AT DOOR OF CHURCH

Dean of Religious Education Declares Tuition of Children Lacking

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 17.—Responsibility for the crime wave was laid at the door of the church Tuesday by Dr. Walter S. Athearn, of Boston, dean of religious education at Boston university, upon his arrival to attend the 16th annual convention of the Missouri Sunday school council.

Until the churches can match the excellence of the public school system with an equally good religious educational system, Dr. Athearn sees no hope that the crime wave will abate.

"There are more than 28,000,000 children in this country who are not in any way reached by any religious education," the educator declared. "There's your seed-bed of crime, social unrest and anarchy."

A survey to determine the ethical attitude of children on questions of honesty conducted by Dr. Athearn resulted in the startling replies that they did not consider it dishonest to steal from one who had obtained his money dishonestly.

In answer to a question as to who in their opinion, has obtained their fortunes dishonestly, the children listed the following:

Bankers, lawyers, landlords, real estate men, manufacturers, railroads, street car and other big corporations.

"A break down in the ethical educational system of the country is responsible for this attitude by the children," said Dr. Athearn. "We withdraw the teaching of religion from the schools because it was not democratic. The churches assumed the responsibility and the churches have fallen down on the job."
