CHICAGO, Nov. 17. (United News)—The exponents of the beer and alkic racket in Chicago took a day off Tuesday to bury one of their fallen brethren, Samuel "Samoots" Amatuna, who departed this life several days ago in what was a rather violent, but picturesque eruption of gangland's endless warfare.

More than 2,000 persons came to the funeral of suave Sicilian, who ruled the underworld with a soft voice, and two sledge-hammer fists. It was said of "Samoots" that he disdained to carry a gat. Perhaps this was a bit of fiction, but anyway there was no automatic found on "Samoots" person, when he rolled over on the floor of a barber shop in West Chicago several days ago, with two bullets in his neck.

Only one thing marred the gesture of gangland's power, "Samoots" was denied a church funeral. The tears of Rose Pecoraro, who was his sweetheart, and the pleadings of his friends were of no avail, "Samoots" was buried without benefit of clergy.
