ACCUSED ENTERS  
PLEA NOT GUILTY

Accused Faces Two Charges  
In Court on Bad Check  
And Larceny Count

Arraigned in circuit court before Judge A. L. Leavitt yesterday, Walter Jacobson, indicted by the grand jury on two counts, entered pleas of not guilty to both charges.

Jacobson, arrested Monday near Klamath Falls, is accused of issuing a check without funds to cover it, and with larceny in a dwelling. He had been sought by officers for about a month before he was taken into custody. Jacobson's trial will follow others Monday set by Judge Leavitt and probably will be held about December 3.

FILMS DESTROYED  
IN \$100,000 FIRE

Explosion Fells Contact of

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Nov. 18.—Films valued at \$100,000 were destroyed here in a fire which threatened for a time to demolish the entire plant of the Fine Arts motion picture studio.

One of the films was being shown in a projection room when it came in contact with a heated electric wire. An explosion followed, which set fire to five other films, comprising more than 30 reels.

The prompt arrival of Los Angeles fire department saved the destruction of several new stages, valued at \$200,000.
