bunk, of course, but it will be tried.

No one can blame Carpentier for accepting the offer to return to the land of promise and big dough for another bout or two. It is a matter of finances with him.

As for the dear public. It can be excused for paying good money to see him box, because he still retains one asset. That is color. He is the most colorful fighter that ever stepped into the ring. He figuratively oozes color—from the lily whiteness of his skin and the bright red stripes of his trunks to his dashing habit of claiming a foul.

Carpentier rose to prominence through battles lost legitimately or won on a claim, real or alleged, of foul or lost on fouls.

He was licked by half a dozen good American fighters early in his career, which defeats only carried the reverse reaction.

Carp has a wonderful style in the ring. He is quick—in his prime he was as quick as a panther. He has a dazzling left jab and a habit of driving his right home with a leaping plunge from an arm's length distance away. It was one of these long distance rights that befogged Jack Dempsey's brain and forced him to stall a few minutes until his

head cleared.

Carpentier added color to himself through his war record, a record that challenges criticism. He was one of the first French athletes to rush to the colors and was wounded in action.

His natural refinement added more color. His reception of his first two visits to this country was marked by the presence of the social and intellectual elite. He is a scholar more than a pug.

His coming should be of benefit to the game in the United States. It should show more clearly than anything else to what a low degree the game has slipped here.

What a sad state of affairs when a hasbeen from Europe has to be imported to keep the sport alive.

When Carpentier goes again, what then?

Probably the best that will be produced will be another Wills-Johnson fiasco.
