Ashland Visitor—W. E. Smith-peter, who makes frequent business visits to Klamath Falls is spending several days in the city on business from his home in Ashland.

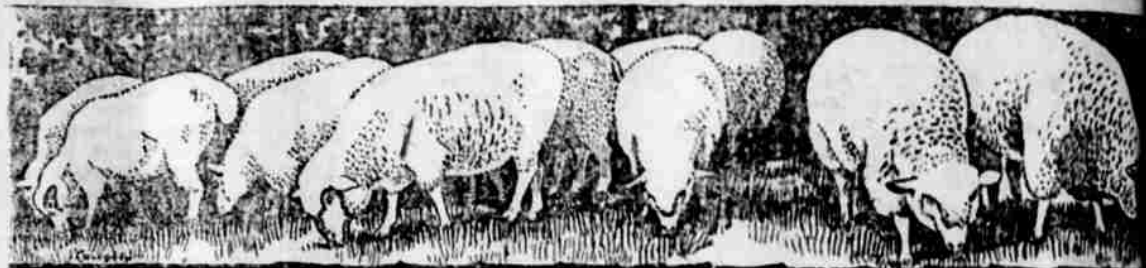
