RED CROSS DRIVE OUT FOR RECORD

Committee Reports Indicate Response This Year to Be Best in Decade

- By MAYBELLE LEAVITT As the reports come in from day to day on the progress of the annual roll call of the American Red Cross it is ever more apparent that Klamath will make this the biggest year in ten preceding drives. One of the most encouraging reports was received from Mrs. Orville Elliott of Klamath Agency. So far in the drive she has collected \$59, which represents an increase over last year of \$25. There are other communities which are showing equally fine response to the plea for charity. The mills in particular are proving themselves generous. The Pelican Bay Lumber company leads all other mills with a total donation of \$246, with their logging camps still to be heard from. According to P. A. Albertson, who is taking care of the drive at the mill, \$25 of this sum was given by H. D. Mortenson, \$121 by employees and \$100 by the company. Mrs. Matt Egan solicited \$107 at Algoma, which is many times greater than the amount collected last year. The people at Modoc Point were generous with a contribution toward membership amounting to \$57. This is besides a check for \$20 sent in from the mill. W. E. Lamm gave his personal check for \$25 also. The Klamath Lumber and Box company, under the leadership of Robert Getz, has turned in \$100 up to date. In spite of the fact that there is little less than a week remaining, few outside precincts have been heard from with the exception of the messages reporting that things are

Since they had much to do with the collecting of the \$350 which the booths turned in, Mrs. Perrin is anxious to give them the credit due. Booths will not be used today, but the Boy Scouts will assist in gathering in the loose ends in a house-to-house canvass. Fourteen boys have signified their willingness and will be on the job bright and early. The winning team of boys will be entertained by Mrs. Perrin at the close of the day.
