Electric Chair
Pennsylvania

PHILA, Nov. 23.—Fifteen-year-old Willie Cavalier is known as the youngest to end the electric chair in Pennsylvania.

supreme court denied the appeal of his lawyers Monday. He had been convicted of the murder of his grandmother in Pottsville. Lawyers had appealed the conviction.

appears that upon the death of the state of Pennsylvania the name of Willie Cavalier is one of the youngest ever legally executed in the state.

the court held that the law by which the law was made was unconstitutional. Willie Cavalier was killed in 1911 when he killed his mother, Mrs. Catherine Cavert.
