SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 24.—Rupture of negotiations for a plebiscite to determine the fate of Tacna and Arica is almost certain, according to general impressions among well informed Chileans. The situation, they believe, is well nigh hopeless.

While a rupture of negotiations is likely and would be followed by a long delay in adjustment of the dispute involving the two provinces, there is not the slightest indication that Chile will interrupt her friendly relations with the United States. Neither has Chile any intention to go to war over the disputed provinces, as it is realized that such action would be foolish.

# NEGRESS READY READY FOR STAND

### Colored Wife of Rich Young New Yorker Will Testify In Amazing Drama

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Nov. 24. Mrs. Alice Jones Rhinelander, thus far a silent spectator in the amazing drama of miscegenation being enacted in Westchester county court house, is to have her day on the stand Wednesday.

The plaintiff has rested, Abruptly, Isaac N. Mills, Leonard Rhinelander's venerable, white-haired counsel, terminated his case Tuesday afternoon.

Eyes turned towards the defendant, but she was obviously in no condition to begin the ordeal. Shaken with sobs, near hysteria, because of her experiences of Monday when she bared her body to the jury to show its ebony hue, Mrs. Rhinelander could not take the stand.

Her lawyer announced she would be called the first thing in the morning. The case of young Rhinelander for annulment of his marriage to his partly colored bride was completed when he appeared on the stand for a second brief cross-examination.

The defense opened by presenting the testimony of Barbara Reynolds, a newspaper woman, who said that when she questioned Leonard Rhinelander immediately after his marriage to Alice Jones became known, the youth admitted to her that he had "married the daughter of a colored man."

Leonard asked, she said, that this be kept from his father, Philip Rhinelander, a leader of New York society. "Our happiness is involved," she quoted the plaintiff as saying.

The next witness for the defense was Leon R. Jacobs, associate counsel for Leonard Rhinelander, who fenced with Mrs. Rhinelander's fighting attorney Lee Parsons Davis and ended by affirming that there was "not a single falsehood" in the bill of particulars.

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to Davis that the bill of particulars contained five falsehoods.

The plaintiff's counsel later attempted to introduce an amended complaint which read that Mrs. Rhinelander, before her marriage, "concealed from the plaintiff the fact that she was of colored blood."

Davis objected, on the ground that the original complaint, upon which the case thus far has been tried, asserted that Mrs. Rhinelander deceived her husband and asserted she was white. Justice Murchauer intimated decidedly that he would not grant the motion to amend the complaint.

The defense put on the stand the negro gardener, Robert Brooks, who married Alice's sister, Brooks, a dark chocolate color, with kinky hair, said he had known Leonard Rhinelander when the latter was courting Alice.

Brooks said he was introduced as Alice's brother-in-law, that Rhinelander suggested they call each other "Len" and "Bob" and that the plaintiff dined at the Brooks' home and played "penny ante" in a game with negroes.

The last witness for the plaintiff was Mrs. Joseph Rich, wife of a Mount Vernon furniture dealer, who testified Alice deceived her about her color. She revealed a new touch to the sordid story of young Rhinelander's mesalliance when she told of how the little colored bride dreamed of a "re-union dinner" with Philip Rhinelander and others from the social register, as guests—to greet her as the wife of one of them.

insurgents, Frazier, and Ladd of North Dakota, LaFollette, of Wisconsin and Smith Brookhart of Iowa were deprived of republican status. That move was hotly opposed by the whole progressive-republican group, including Senator Borah and also by Senator Curtis, of Kansas, regular republican leader. But they were over ridden by a group of young fascist, including Reed of Pennsylvania and Edge of New Jersey, who thrust aside their more hesitant elders.

The present effort to exclude dissenters has gained administration prestige because of the recent declaration of Senator William M. Butler, of Massachusetts, chairman of the republican national committee, who not only opposed LaFollette's election with every resource at his command but a few days ago announced that party discipline must be enforced and those who disapproved of the party policies must get out.

When the issue was up last winter, the republican leaders adopted a simple test of simon-pure republicanism by asking just one question: Did the senator oppose the election of President Coolidge? As the president is not running this year the test is being modified to: Did the senator criticize the president and the republican party?
