'Search and Seizure' Bill Up in Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 24.—The drastic "search and seizure" prohibition enforcement bill Tuesday night went to Governor Martin for his signature, having been passed by both branches of the legislature. The governor recommended the act, and he is expected to sign the bill.

The measure met strong opposition in the senate, but was finally passed by a vote of 19 to 11. The house acted upon the measure Monday.

The new law will give officers authority to search automobiles or other vehicles, or property upon suspicion, without search warrants.

"The prohibition law is being violated by 'blind tiger' men who are hauling automobiles and truck loads of liquor on the highways of this state by day and night," declared Senator Knight of Starke, in a speech, favoring the act.

Would Investigate Rent Profiteers

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 24.—(United News)—A resolution asking the attorney general to make a sweeping investigation of hotel rates and rents in Florida and prosecute any "profiteers," was bitterly debated in the lower house of the Florida legislature Tuesday, finally was defeated by a vote of 41 to 31. The resolution was offered by Representative Fred Davis, who said "we have voted an appropriation

for a new penitentiary, and I know of no better use this could be put to than to house rent profiteers."

The motion was opposed on the grounds that prices were being regulated by the law of supply and demand, and that the resolution would discourage builders and "give enemies of Florida material to carry on their false propaganda in this state."

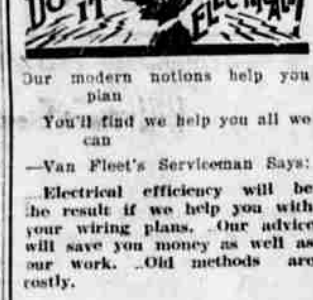
