BONES OF TOY PAN ARE TO BE TAKEN FROM KLAMATH FALLS TO REST IN ORIENTAL HEAVEN

An old Chinese custom, a belief promising burial in the native land, older than the civilization of the Americas, has entered Klamath Falls.

For nine long years the remains of Toy Pan have lain in heathen ground, in Linkville cemetery. For nine long years the spirit of Toy Pan has not been permitted to enter the celestial paradise of his forefathers and illustrious ancestors for it was roving over America.

At last the spirit of Toy Pan will find eternal happiness, for his bones are to be taken from his resting place, carefully scraped, placed in a clean linen sack and returned to China where he will sleep peacefully with no devil-gods to torture him.

Toy Pan was a cook in Klamath Falls for W. W. Smith, a former lawyer, ten years ago. Nine years ago he died. Before his death, however, he had been a member of the Six Companies tong, one of their benefits demanding a titling system, that of ten per cent of the yearly wages, the tong in turn

Members of the Six Companies tong have arrived, headed by Wong Kak of Yreka to fulfill this promise. The bones of Toy Pan are the only Chinese remains in Klamath Falls that belonged to that tong. There are five in Ashland, 14 in Shasta City and 59 in Yreka. The majority of the Yreka Chinese have died during prospecting years.

All cemeteries in northern California and southern Oregon are being investigated in the hope of finding the remains of a chosen member of the tong. All remains will be taken to Yreka where they will join many others from the Pacific coast, in their wrappings of clean linen and shipped to the Orient. There are 1600 in all, according to Wong Kay yesterday.

For the next six weeks the bodies will be taken from their graves and be on their way, six in a box, to the Land of the Faithful, where a happy eternity awaits the spirit of those that find rest in old China.

Sports Done Brown

By NORMAN E. BROWN The fastest man in baseball is awaiting another chance to make the grade in the major leagues. He is Maurice Archdeacon.

Archdeacon now holds the world's record for circling the bases with a time of 13 2-5 seconds. It was his terrific speed which first drew attention to him while he was serving his novitiate with the Charleston club of the South Atlantic league back in 1919. In two seasons there he stole 86 bases. The first year he hooked 42 of them with the aid of a none too healthy batting average—.329.

The Boston Braves had a string on him for 1921, but sent him to George Stallings' Rochester club. In three campaigns there he proceeded to burn up the paths, stealing 53 bases in one season, 55 the next and 31 the next. This speed and his hitting, around .330 for the three seasons, caused the Chicago White Sox to pay out just \$50,000 for his services.

This money was paid with the confidence that he would proceed to set the major league on fire with that same speed. Why shouldn't he? He could hit. He had played the outfield for three years under Stallings' eagle eye, and he had the fleetest pair of legs in the game.

Then the awakening for Maurice and the Sox bosses.

In 22 games in 1923 Archdeacon managed to steal two bases. True he did not play through all those games. But he managed to collect 35 hits.

The next season he took part in 98 games—enough to show his stuff. But the American league pitchers

and catchers tied him hand and foot on the bases. He managed to steal but 11 sacks.

He hit the ball in good style—grabbing a .319 batting average in 1924. But his outfielding was not brilliant enough to shove the other Sox regulars out of the lineup. So Eddie Collins decided he wasn't needed. He was sent back to the International league to become a member of the Baltimore Orioles.

Back in the minors he proceeded to shine again with his old brilliancy, fielding, hitting and running the bases in great style. Which showing caused scouts of the Washington club to recommend he be sought in the draft. Washington obtained him.

But whether or not he will land a berth is still a matter of grave doubt. Stan Harris probably intends to keep McNeely as the running mate for Edgar Rice and Goose Goslin. Little Nemo Leibold is still a dependable outfielder who knows the game, and is a heady if not a fast man on the bases.

Harris demands keen baseball. Archdeacon did not show himself to be a head-up player with the Sox. Can he make the grade this time, or will he carry his wings back to the minors?
