Klamath Falls Aids Self-Help College

A new women's building to provide adequate quarters for the women students of Albany Self-Help college is expected to result from a series of vaunting parties now being given throughout the state under the auspices of the Woman's Albany College League.

Need for this new building became evident some months ago when the rapidly increasing student body and the extended college program indicated that even the increased facilities offered by the new administration building, now under construction, would prove inadequate. After careful consideration, Mrs. F. I. Fuller, of Portland, president of the league, gave the first party, to which nine other women were invited.

Each guest contributed \$1 to the building fund and agreed to be hostess to eight other women, each of whom would contribute \$1 and be hostess to seven women, who, in turn, will give a party for six, and so on, until the parties "vanish." By this democratic plan enough money will be raised to construct and equip a modern dormitory.

Each of these women will in the immediate future, invite seven other women to be their guests.
