BRITISH DOWAGER RESTS IN CHAPEL

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will bear Queen Alexandra's body from Sandringham to the railway station about three miles from the royal residence.

Servants and school children will escort the body through what promises to be bitterly cold weather, with a flurry of snow.

On arriving in London the body will be taken to the Chapel Royal in St. James palace, to remain overnight.

Four kings will be in the funeral procession from the chapel to Westminster abbey Friday; the kings of Denmark, Norway, Belgium and England. There will be other royal persons, including Queen Mary, Queen Maud of Norway, Princess Louise and Victoria, the Prince of Wales, Duke of York and Prince Henry. Detachments of 25 men each will represent the navy, marines and air force, and similar detachments will be in line from the four crack British cavalry regiments, including the nineteenth hussars, of which Alexandra was colonel-in-chief.

The body will remain in state in the abbey until 9 p. m., Friday. Tremendous crowds are expected to be jammed within a radius of a few hundred yards during most of the day.

WOOL PRICES HOLD FIRM

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—There is a general scramble for medium wool, with full prices of the last few days maintained. Warehouse offerings here are being inspected by buyers, and reports indicate further business in choice mediums up to 45c per pound and down to 40c at Umatilla county points. Fine wool bids range from 35c to 40c pound here.

Only a very few scattered clips are held unsold at Oregon, Idaho or Washington country points. Baker is the exception, where holdings are said to aggregate about 250,000 pounds. Only odd lots are held in central Oregon.

Local warehouses are holding about 2,000,000 pounds of Idaho fleece, which will be offered for sale December 7, inspection to be made December 2.
