has bitterly attacked professional football from all angles, including the efforts of the backers to lure college men into the sport.

This spirit of the "pro" enthusiasts in seeking to "undermine" the game is decried.

Other college heads pursue the same course in luring the students to live up to the letter and spirit of the rules (for the good of the game) through their careers.

But this thought will not depart from my mind: Are the colleges adhering to the spirit as well as the letter of their athletic rules in acquiring material for their football teams?

On the way to the office the other morning I visited with a graduate of a western conference school, who was troubled by the fact that he had been approached to "contribute" to the expense incurred in taking some local boys to his alma mater to "show them the place," and then had been informed that more funds would be needed later.

This cannot be an isolated case. This man was not a "big light" in college. The practice must be somewhat general, considering that the plea for funds to carry on the "gathering in" work has reached him.

I asked him why he did not come out with a frank, open statement that he did not sanction such underground activities and furthermore believed such tactics to violate the spirit of sportsmanship.

He hesitated to reply.

What made him hesitate, he admitted later, was his fear that the charge of disloyalty to his old school would be the first charge he'd get at him.

Until the colleges cleanse their own organizations of these "spirit" as well as rule violators they cannot conscientiously become overly incensed at attempts of outsiders to place their own personal interests subservient to the promotion of clean athletics.
