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and the authority of the district court to handle the case.

"The district court is not a federal court," Walsh declared. "It is the equivalent of a state court and cannot try federal cases."

Walsh's strongest plea was based upon the double jeopardy charge.

"We must consider as settled," he said, "the issue of fact raised in the Montana case, which is the same as that raised here, namely, that Wheeler used his influence with the department of interior to urge approval of certain permits to prospect for oil and gas."

Walsh further declared that the defendant was charged by the government merely with violating an "interpretation of the law." Although not admitting that his client had even violated the government's interpretation defense counsel pointed out that the federal law did not limit the number of prospecting permits that might be taken out.

Arguments were scheduled to continue Saturday.
