## LABARA-SCENCIO FIGHT POSTPONED

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 27.—The 12-round bout between Fidel La Barba, flyweight champion of the world, and clever Scencio, Filipino champion, which was to have been held here Wednesday, was postponed because of the serious illness of La Barba. Doctors in attendance on the world's champion declared he was suffering from tonsillitis, and had a fever of 102.

Mile Ballerino, world's junior lightweight champion, and Tod Morgan, Pacific coast king, will substitute for the La Barba-Scencio fight. They will battle for the championship.

## REICHSTAG VOTES SUPPORT LEAGUE

Communist Opposition to  
Country's Entry Drowned  
By Rising Ballot

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—(United News)—Germany will enter the league of nations and assist in the maintenance of peace in western Europe. By overwhelming majorities, the reichstag Friday squelched the communists and nationalists and approved the Locarno treaties.

Communist opposition was defeated by a rising vote; nationalist attempts to sabotage the work of Locarno were accorded the dignity of regular balloting, but the results were no less decisive.

Clusters of curious and interested Germans shivered in the heavy snow fall outside the reichstag building, while the deputies within were participating in the historic sixty minutes of voting, which definitely aligned Germany by the side of her former enemies in the cause of mutual peace.

The reichstag voted that Locarno bill should have the effect of law the day after its promulgation.

Of the preliminary work toward peace in Europe there remains outstanding only the formal signature of the Locarno treaties in London next Tuesday. After that the formulas of peace and work devised at Locarno will be applied and in their application will come the real test of the documents.

Germany's Entry Into League  
Held Enormous Gain In  
Europe's Progress

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The pact of Locarno is not an alliance; it is not a military compact. It is a combination for mutual comfort and succor, not a combination to present a common front to any enemy or group of enemies.
