KENTUCKY SOLON MAY GO TO JAIL

Maneuvers of Fleet Postponed By Navy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—An indictment charging illegal withdrawal of whiskey from a Pennsylvania distillery, returned against Representative John Langley, Kentucky, and Millard F. West, formerly deputy internal revenue collector here, in March, 1924, was not pressed in District of Columbia supreme court today.

Langley has been convicted in Kentucky on a liquor charge and sentenced to two years in prison. The withdrawal indictment here charges conspiracy.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Scheduled maneuvers off the west coast of South America, by the scouting and battle fleets of the United States navy have been cancelled for economy reasons.

After a consultation with high naval officers, Secretary of the Navy Wilbur tonight ordered all plans for the maneuvers abandoned. Conservation of fuel and equipment under the budget plan was given as the reason for this action.

These maneuvers, held yearly were abandoned in 1922 for the same reasons. Wilbur hopes to resume the maneuvers, considered most important, in the tactical training of naval officers, in 1927.

Maneuvers in the Pacific ocean off the Panama canal by both fleets will be carried out as planned, it was said. The two fleets will meet off Balboa some time in February.

Death of Juror's Mother Calls Court

That one of the jurors on a case in his court may attend the funeral of his mother, Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt, of Klamath county, yesterday adjourned court until Monday.

Judge Leavitt's move came when Ralph Tucker, who is one of the 12 men who will decide the fate of C. K. McCarthy, learned that his mother, Mrs. Anna Tucker, had passed away at a local hospital. Tucker asked that his duties might be forgone until Monday. The request was granted. Mrs. Tucker will be buried in the Linkville cemetery.

McCarthy, indicted during a recent session of the grand jury, is charged with larceny from a dwelling.

Mitchell Still Is Under Court Fire

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—War department prosecutors of Col. William Mitchell turned their attention over the week-end to the "flying colonel's" attacks on the navy department, preparatory to presenting rebuttal testimony at the Mitchell court martial next week.

Mitchell's charges against the navy revolved around four major points:

"That the Shenandoah flight con-

stituted criminal negligence; that PN-3-1 Hawaiian flight was the same; that the naval planes sent to the arctic with the MacMillan expedition were unfit, and that the naval bureau of aeronautics is dominated by non-flying officers.

The staff of war department judges advocate abandoning their plans to attend the Army-Navy football game in New York, put in their time questioning prospective witnesses and going over navy records to select material with which to counter attack.

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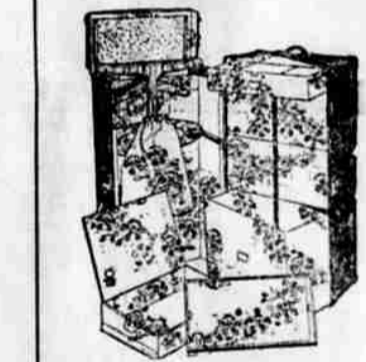
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Leaving for the South—Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Lee left Saturday afternoon by motor for San Francisco and other southern points, where they plan to spend several months.
