HASKELL INDIANS DEFEATED 6 TO 0

Loyola Takes Hard Fighting Warriors Into Camp By Brilliant Open Play

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—(United Press)—Loyola university defeated the Haskell Indian team here today 6 to 0, in a game featured with open play by both teams.

Loyola scored the only points of the game late in the first quarter, when after taking the ball in mid-field they succeeded in completing a series of passes which carried it to the Indian five yard line. Griffen, halfback, then swept around right end for a touchdown.
