Balconies Where Mussolini Death Plot Was Laid
Draw Curious Throngs: Premier's Guard Increased



On the balconies shown in the two photos was to have been enacted the drama which was to end with the snuffing out of the life of Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy. At right is the Albergo Dragoni, hostelry opposite the Ghigi Palace. From the balcony of the room marked with a cross, the conspirators planned to throw a deadly germ bomb to the balcony of the Ghigi Palace, shown above, as Mussolini addressed the populace on the anniversary of the Austro-Italian armistice. The upper photo shows Mussolini delivering his address. The plot was frustrated, however, when a journalist foe of the premier divulged the plans. The plotters were arrested. Extra precautions have been taken to guard Mussolini since the attempt on his life.
