Attorneys interested said the trial has been one of the longest of its kind ever heard in the county. McCarthy was indicted at a recent session of the grand jury.

CAPTAIN APPLIGATE RECEIVES NEW HONOR

Captain O. C. Applegate, veteran of the Modoc and Indian wars, has been appointed state commander of national Indian war veterans, according to an appointment received by him upon his recent return from Jackson county.

The appointment makes Captain Applegate holder of the office of

commander for the period of one year, dating from September 13, 1925. The order is signed by John J. Brandt, commander-in-chief of National Indian war veterans.

According to the newly named commander, there is a re-organization of all veterans of Indian wars throughout the United States in order to look into the matter of caring for the old and dependent and their wives.

PARIS, Dec. 1—(Tuesday)—Senator Berenger soon will succeed Ambassador Emile Dauschner at the embassy in Washington, according to today's issue of Le Journal.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif., Nov. 30.—The seven men captured in a run running attempt north of here Sunday, today were held by United States Commissioner D. J. Dillon to answer before the federal grand jury in Los Angeles.

PORTLAND, Nov. 30.—Two highway robberies, a dozen burglaries and five automobile thefts were cleared up today, according to police, following the arrest of Raymond Walquest, 17, and Howard Smith, 25. Police said both were "graduates" of the state reform school.

THE DALLES, Ore., Nov. 30.—Hughie C. Tracey, 15, and Eugene McDermott, 17, both of Bend, were arrested in The Dalles, early this morning by Police Chief Frank Heater and lodged in the city jail pending investigation of a series of robberies in LaGrande and Pendleton, some of which have been confessed to by the youthful pair.

The boys attempted to park their car, containing more than \$400 worth of loot at First and Union streets this morning and Chief Heater standing by the curb offered to help push the car into the parking space.

Noticing the number of automobile robes and other articles in the tonneau, Heater became suspicious and ordered them to drive to the police station, where a complete check of the stolen articles was made and demanding confession obtained.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Austen Chamberlain, the British foreign secretary who engineered the Locarno treaties which are to be signed Tuesday has received the highest honor, within the power of his sovereign to bestow and henceforth chamberlain is Sir Austen Chamberlain, K. G. The K. G. stands for knight of the garter, which in turn stands for all that is good and chivalrous in men.

The knighthood was granted directly for Sir Austen's work at Lo-

caro, and simultaneously Mrs. Chamberlain was made a dame of the order of the British empire. Henceforth her title is dame.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Despite the criticisms and demands for his resignation, made by some influential newspapers, Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, intends to stay in the cabinet for the time being at least. He announced Monday night that he has refused appointment as chief justice of the California supreme court.

Committee Probes Arguments For a Federal Building

In compliance with the suggestions of Senators McNary and Stanford and Congressman Sinnott, members of the local federal building committee met in the chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon and heard the reading of the data which will be sent to the congressmen in connection with the petition for a federal building in Klamath Falls.
