Sports Done Brown

By NORMAN E. BROWN It can be said, in all justice to everyone concerned, that Fielding H. Yost celebrated his 25th year as coach of the Michigan grid team by winning the Big Ten title.

Now, of course, technically, he did not win a clear claim to it. The Wolverines lost one game. Northwestern also lost but one conference game. And it so happens that Michigan's only defeat was at the hands of Northwestern.

So a Northwestern loyalist will tell you the Evanston institution deserves the title.

But on the other hand—Michigan played six conference games and won five of them. The Yostmen turned back Illinois, Ohio State, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Indiana. The Ann Arbor team met the Minnesota eleven when it was at the peak of form and was, without a doubt, the most formidable team in the conference.

Northwestern played Chicago, Indiana, Purdue and Michigan. Indiana and Purdue were the poorest teams in the conference. Chicago whipped Northwestern. The slender thread on which the latter's claim to the title rests in that 2 to 2 victory over Michigan—whereas Michigan presents five victories, with Indiana the only weak spot on it. Ohio State was rounding into form when the Michigan game came along. That is proved by Ohio's showing the following week against Illinois.

Go further into the records of the teams. Both Illinois and Wisconsin trounced Chicago, conquerors of Northwestern. Michigan licked both those teams.

Iowa had beaten Illinois and Ohio State, and lost a close game to Wisconsin when Minnesota tackled the Iowans—and proceeded to score five touchdowns.

Then Michigan trounced Minnesota by the handsome score of 30 to 0.

Northwestern cannot produce such a record.

Glenn Thistlewaite had a good team. Had Ralph Baker been available all through the season the result might have been different. But no one, under existing conditions, can question Michigan's supremacy.

Speaking of the Big Ten race, Indiana and Purdue had the merry time. Neither won a conference game. Then they closed the season by tackling each other—and played to a scoreless tie. Can't beat that for zero in achievements.

And how puffed the Indiana adherents were. Purdue had not won a game from the Hoosier team in nine years when the two teams clashed last fall. It was a gala day, so to speak. Purdue was opening its new stadium—and proceeded to celebrate the event by licking their old rivals. So Indiana was out for blood this year.

JOHN M'CALL CALLS FOR EARLY MAILING

"Mail early and shop early" is the slogan adopted by the Klamath Falls post office crew, who are already feeling the heavy weight of Christmas mailing as it begins its annual influx into the office.

For the first time in the history of the post office, the windows will be closed. According to John A. McCall, Klamath postmaster, the opening on Christmas Day has not been successful and if residents heed the "mail early" plea, there will be no need of congestion on that day.
