IOWA PRODUCERS GET FARM LOANS

CHICAGO, Dec. 1. — (United News)—The federal government, in league with bankers and business men of the middlewest, has decided to give further aid to Iowa farmers, who are going into bankruptcy because they do not have enough capital to market their bumper crop at a reasonable profit.

Meeting at the federal reserve bank here Tuesday afternoon, Secretary of Agriculture William A. Jardine and a score of corn belt business men, arranged for establishing two more national credit corporations in Iowa, one at Des Moines, and the other at Fort Dodge.

Through these mediums — each capitalized at \$250,000, and with a combined loaning power of \$5,000,000—farmers may be able to borrow enough money to enable them to hold their corn for higher prices, due later in the winter.

Secretary Jardine called the corn conference on the strength of reports by special investigators sent out from Washington. The investigators said they found Iowa's present credit institutions inadequate to swing the immense crop of corn. Bank failures were common, and farmers were being forced by circumstances to sell their corn at low prices in order to meet their debts.

Establishment of the new credit institutions is to be accomplished within the next fortnight, under the provisions of the federal farm loan system.

Hold-Up Claims He Hails from Klamath

Reclamation Faces State-Wide Probe

SALEM, Dec. 1.—(United News)—A state-wide inquiry into reclamation affairs in Oregon was ordered today by the trustees of the Oregon reclamation congress.

Willford Allen, Grants Pass, president of the congress, announced the appointment of the following investigating committee: W. Lair Thompson, Portland; Percy Cupper, Salem; Ivan M. Oakes, Ontario; Whitney L. Boise, Portland; Ralph Cowgill, Medford; Judge N. G. Wallace, Prineville, and Sam H. Brown, Gervais.

A proposal to merge the Oregon reclamation congress and the Oregon drainage association was approved.



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
