SALEM, Dec. 2.—Loss from the \$328,411.49 loaned by the state to wheat growers of central Oregon last winter will amount to not more than two per cent or approximately \$8,000, according to figures submitted to the board of control today by James Stewart, field inspector of the board.

PAWUSKA, Okla., Dec. 2.—Damon Lewis, chief of police of Miami Beach, Fla., who with three other members of an alleged narcotic ring operating in Oklahoma, was sentenced Saturday to seven years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kas., will present an appeal bond of \$10,000 within a few days, his attorneys said Wednesday night.

SALEM, Dec. 2.—The supreme court today upheld the validity of an assessment levied by the Ochoco irrigation district in Crook county to cover "delinquencies on assessments" to meet bond obligations. The opinion sustains a demurrer filed by Sheriff Yancey of Crook county to an alternative writ of mandamus secured by J. Noble, land owner in the district in an effort to compel the sheriff to accept his tender of taxes, minus the delinquency assessment in full payment of the lien against his land.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 2.—Rev. Billy Sunday will be invited to conduct an evangelistic campaign on Coos bay next year, following his scheduled campaign in Ashland. It was decided today by the Coos and Curry Ministerial association meeting in Myrtle Point.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2.—Fearing a hijacking attempt, federal prohibition officials today ordered the removal of 10,000 cases of liquor from the rum runner Coal Harbor, held in the harbor here. The liquor was stored under guard in the basement of the United States appraisers' building. It is valued at approximately \$500,000.

HELENA, Dec. 2.—Bishop John P. Carroll, head of the Helena diocese, who recently died in Switzerland, was buried here today, with noted Catholic clergymen from all

parts of the west in attendance. Archbishop Austin Dowling of St. Paul conducted the services, while the eulogy was read by Archbishop Edward J. Hanna of San Francisco.

BEND, Dec. 2.—To hear injunction suits against the city of Bend, brought to prevent the sale of \$600,000 worth of water bonds, and the letting of a contract for a pipe line from Tumalo creek to the city, Judge Dalton Biggs of Malheur, Grant and Harney counties, will be here December 10. Judge T. E. O. Duffy of the central Oregon judicial district, will be on the Portland bench while Judge Biggs is here.

BUTTE, Dec. 2.—Hughie Wren, 29, was adjudged guilty of murder in the first degree tonight by a jury which heard his case, punishment being left to the court to be pronounced Saturday. Wren was accused of killing an Austrian last April in a quarrel over a French girl.

MARSHFIELD, Dec. 2.—Three Lascar seamen of the British steamship Kumeric, now loading in Coos bay, languish in the city jail today after a few brief and furtive hours of freedom, following their escape last night from the Kumeric. One was picked up in Marshfield early today by Policeman Richardson, and two others were captured at East Side by Chief of Police Carter. They made their escape by climbing down ropes and stealing a boat. They will be held in jail here until the ship sails.

Would Reform Senate Rules And Do Away With The Filibuster

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Loaded with ammunition for the hardest battle of his long public career, Vice President Charles G. Dawes is en route to Washington to engage the United States senate in a finish fight to reform its rules and outlaw the filibuster. The vice president was smiling when he entrained for the east

shortly after noon Wednesday, but his jaw was set and his friends said he was confident of victory. There is every indication that he is determined to continue hurling bombs into the dignified senate until he gets what he wants.

Since the last session of congress Dawes has spent almost all of his time campaigning for a reform of the senate rules permitting filibusters which have permitted minority rule on many occasions in that body. He has traveled to both coasts and has delivered numerous addresses in the home communities of some of his worst enemies in the senate.

The reform measure is expected to crop up in the form of a resolution to be introduced by Senator Oscar Underwood, democrat, Alabama, providing for limiting debate by a vote of a majority. The ensuing parliamentary war probably will be the bitterest of any since the house clipped the powers of the speaker.

Dawes told an audience of women here this week that he is determined to carry his campaign into the ballroom of every senator who opposes him. The vice president wants to make his proposal a burning national issue and says he is prepared to work for the defeat in their home states of all who do not agree with him.

Converted Over

W. O. Smith, who had opposed the city managership form of government in a series of debates conducted three years ago by the chamber, was called upon by Lynn Sablin, chamber secretary, to tell what he held against the proposal. Smith explained that he had been selected to uphold the negative side of the question and that if he were not convinced at that time, that since he had become converted. Smith advised that a report be had from Astoria where managership had enabled that municipality to progress in a manner impossible under the antiquated councilmanic system.

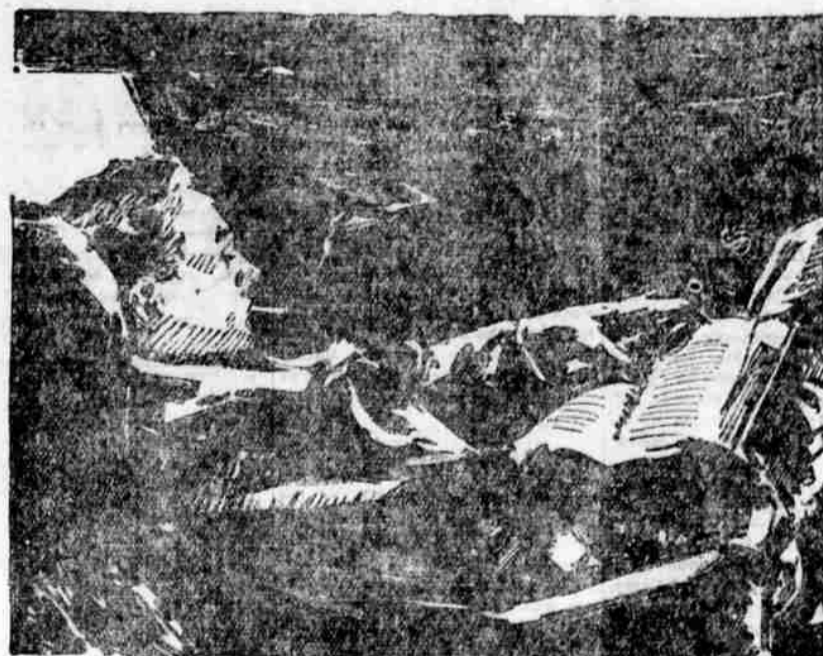
