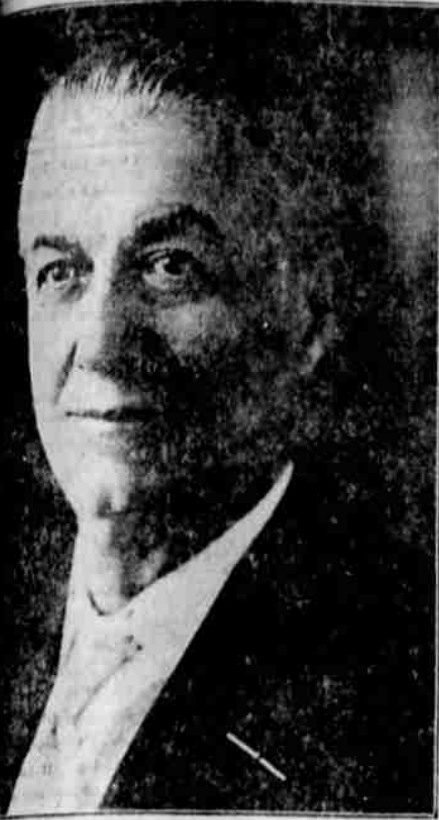

CHRISTMAS SEALS TO FIGHT WHITE PLAGUE
