Leaving for Portland—T. P. Henderson of the Klamath Development company, is leaving today for Portland, where he plans to spend several days looking into business affairs.

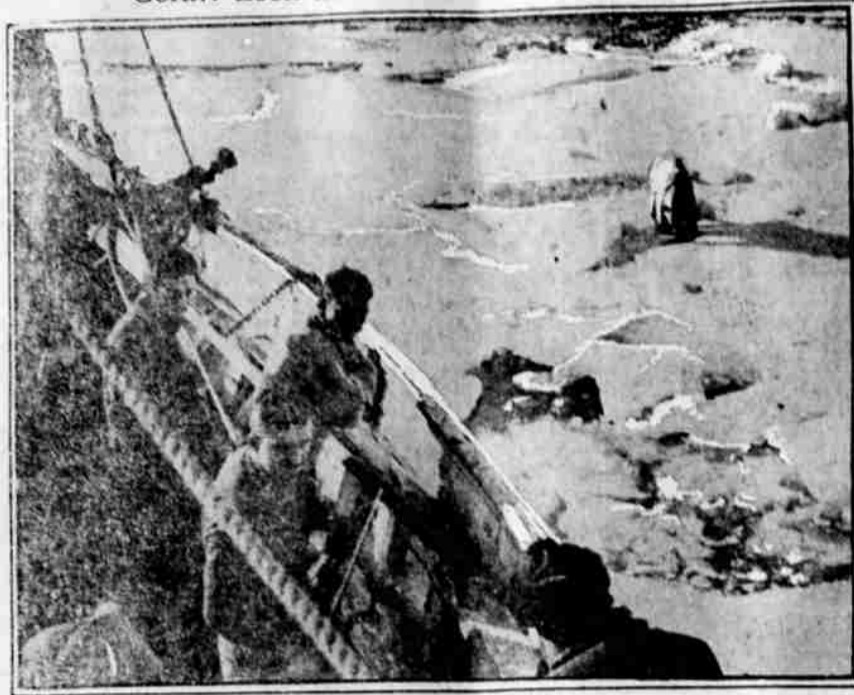
Darley Expected in—C. T. Darley is expected to return today from Salem, where he has spent the past week on business affairs in connection with the engineering department of the city.

PARTY HARMONY HAS NO APPEAL TO INSURGENTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—As part of a republican attempt to secure harmony in the senate, overtures of peace will be extended to Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin and Gerald P. Nye, of North Dakota, the two "boy" insurgent members from the northwest.

Both will be invited to the regular republican caucus Saturday and Senator Watson, chairman of the committee on committees will

write them a formal letter asking them what committee assignments they desire conditional upon the two coming into the fold as republicans. Watson made this announcement Tuesday after a call upon President Coolidge.

It is believed that "Young Bob" will decline to attend the caucus, as did his father for many years, and will stand with the two older insurgent members, who followed the elder LaFollette, Brookhart of Iowa and Frazier of North Dakota and who were ousted from the party organization last year. Nye also is expected to decline.
