Sports Done Brown

The recent feat of the Harvard football team in holding the Yale eleven to a 0 to 0 tie no doubt thrilled all Harvard and its far-flung loyal legions. That can be accepted as a fact.

Even those who have come to doubt the wisdom of trying to keep Yale, Harvard and Princeton intact as the Big Three (in view of the frequent setbacks suffered at the hands of smaller elevens on the part of Harvard in particular) were thrilled by the outcome of that game.

But it can also be said that the tie—carrying more weight than victory usually does—produced complications.

The annihilation at the hands of Princeton, after a couple of other trouncings, had caused the opinion to crystallize in the minds of most Crimson supporters that what the team needed most was a house-cleaning in the coaching department.

Bob Fisher, head coach for several years, had been under some fire before the 1925 season started. It was only because those in charge of Harvard athletics had faith in him that he was asked to continue his work.

Major Daly, who had demonstrated his ability as a coach with the Army eleven, was asked to so arrange his duties with the reserve corps at Harvard that he could devote some time to aiding Fisher. Eddie Mahan, who helped write a few brilliant chapters in Harvard grid history, also joined the squad.

But no positive results were produced—at least not until the Yale game. And, after all, a scoreless tie cannot be considered a very emphatic victory.

There came early from Cambridge the word that Daly was not working harmoniously with Fisher. Or put it the other way, if you will. Some Harvard grads in close touch with the situation, felt that Daly was not finding the time needed to give his best to the team. Others blamed the differences on the divergence in opinion regarding football tactics.

Well, anyhow—

Just when everyone decided that the team—and the school—needed a new coaching staff, some 60,000 of this crowd saw what was supposed to be a powerful Yale eleven held scoreless by the Crimson misfits.

Which immediately aroused hopes of Crimson followers that firm footing had been found at last in the coaching department.

But on the other hand, those who follow the game closely decided in

midseason that the weak point in the Harvard team was in the "brains" and not in the brawn. In other words the material was there, but poorly handled. I talked to one old Harvard star who saw two of the mid-season games, and he was amazed at the confusion and uncertainty that existed on the Harvard team on offense and defense.

So the probabilities are there will be some radical changes in coaching personnel by next fall. Fisher is tired of the job. Whether Daly is given full charge as his successor or whether a new man with new ideas will be asked to assume the burden is another matter.
