Seventy Thousand For Midland Road

According to County Judge R. H. Bunnell, \$70,000 will be expended during 1926 on the Midland market road. The cost of surfacing the Midland road will be approximately \$53,000. This will cover a stretch from Klamath Falls to Midland. Also the Spring lake section of the market road, which connects with the Merrill highway, will be graded at a cost of about \$17,500.
