PANATROPE WILL BE DEMONSTRATED MONDAY
The Panatrope, a new music reproducing instrument perfected by scientists of the Radio Corporation of America, The General Electric Co., The Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Co., and The Brunswick-Balke-Collender Co. will be demonstrated for the first time in Klamath Falls on next Monday afternoon and evening, at Currin's drug store. The Panatrope is entirely different from the phonograph or any sound reproducing instrument heretofore or now on the market. Recording and reproduction of the sounds are made through electricity. In the usual phonograph the tool, cutting the wax of the original record is moved by the actual sound vibrations, but here the sound is received by a telephone transmitter which produces electric currents and these amplified by vacuum tools operate a most precise cutting tool. In this a beam of light 1-100 of an inch square plays an important part. In reproducing the needle actuates a strip of metal, called the

electrical pick-up, from which electrical currents pass through a vacuum tube amplifier and produce the sound through a newly developed loud speaker. In these instruments an alternating current from the regular house supply operates the amplifier. The instrument can also be used as a radio receiver in addition to its usefulness in playing regular phonograph records. It can also be operated with dry or wet cell batteries where regular electric current is not available. The program which will be demonstrated at Currin's will consist of a comprehensive list of records, vocal, and instrumental, selected from the recordings of the best popular and classic artists of today. The public is cordially invited to hear this instrument which has received an innovation wherever shown.
