

Klamath Scouts Enjoy Big Hike

On Saturday, December 5, the first all city hike was held. Eighteen boys, Tenderfoot and Second Class Scouts, under the leadership of Scout Executive E. O. Nord, and Senior Patrol Leader Merle Swanson of troop 1, left the chamber of commerce at 10 a. m., marching in single file for the hike objective, Fort Rock, on the old Fort Klamath road. While on the hike the boys practiced some of their scout songs and yells and after reaching their destination they began to prepare for the various tests. The Tenderfeet passed tests in cooking, use of knife and hatchet, compass and tracking while the Second Class Scouts passed tests in advanced cooking, signaling, axe work, and judging distance, weight and size. Some of the cooking dishes were fine, especially the Hunter's stew, made by the Massey boys. All the boys made their own fires with only one match to pass the fire building test.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Having achieved the foundations for security in Europe through the Locarno pacts, the statesmen of the great nations are now turning their attention to widening the stabilizing influence so far gained.

The United Press learned today that the great problems with which

European leaders are now struggling are:

First, an attempt to induce Russia to re-enter the concert of nations.

Second, the summoning of an international disarmament conference.

Third, launching of a huge financial transaction, whereby a portion of the 11,000,000,000 gold marks of the Dawes plan held by the reparations commission will be marketed to provide Franch with ready cash.

Fourth, general restoration of pre-war commercial conditions.

NAVAL EXPERTS OFFER DENIALS

Take Exception to Scores of Charges of the Fiery Col. Mitchell

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The United States navy had its inning today at the court martial trial of Col. William Mitchell for misconduct when the highest ranking officer of the department and one of its aviation experts flatly denied a score of the Texas colonel's sensational charges against the service.

Admiral E. W. Eberle, chief of naval operations, a white bearded officer of the old school, asserted that there were no differences between the department and commander Zachary Lansdowne over the fateful flight westward of Lansdowne's airship, the naval dirigible Shenandoah.

A slight disagreement arose over the proposed route, Eberle said, but when certain changes were made and a new mooring mast was erected at Detroit Lansdowne was "satisfied," he contended.

The old officer withstood the terrific cross-questioning by Representative Frank Reid, Mitchell's lawyer, and proved an excellent witness for his service. There was no disagreement with Lansdowne over

the condition of the airship, Eberle asserted.

Lieut. Commander R. G. Leighton, a naval observer of the United States army round the world flight, denied the charges that this maneuver had been mismanaged through lack of navy co-operation.

He also denied that an enemy air fleet could attack this country over the route of the world flyers.

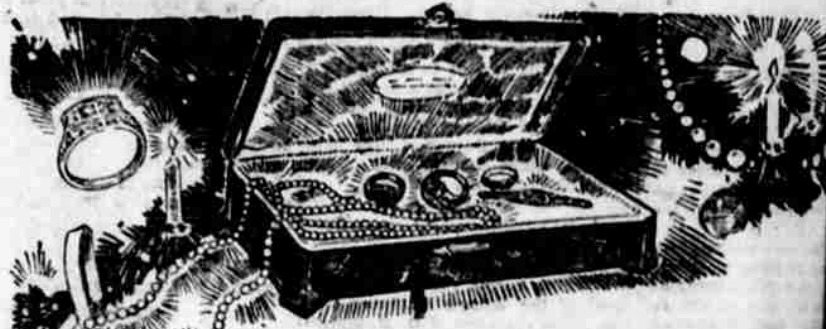
