Market Road Check Received By Court

The Klamath county court yesterday received its second installment of the 1925 market road fund from the state, it was announced last evening by County Judge R. H. Bunnell.

The check amounted to \$14,500. The money so received is derived from a market road levy by the state on the assessed valuation of the county, it was explained. The state levy is one mill.

The county, in turn, levied approximately one and one-half mills and derived therefrom approximately \$5,000. This money was turned over to the state which, subsequently, sees that it is returned to the county.
