

AUTO ORDINANCE GETS 22 WEEK-END VICTIMS

NEW CABLE HAS HUGE CAPACITY

Five hundred and twenty telegraph messages and 258 telephone conversations are now possible at one time between New York and Chicago, over the American Telephone & Telegraph company's new 861-mile long-distance cable, which has just been completed and turned over to the public for commercial purposes, according to word received here yesterday.

This long stretch of cable which links the two greatest metropolises in the United States has been under construction since 1918, when research and development work was successfully terminated and the conception of cable connections in place of open wires was completed.

DOHENY TO FACE FURTHER TRIALS

Government Expects to Go to The Bottom of Famous Oil Scandals

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(United News)—with the legal obstacle in the way of continued prosecution swept away, the government is expected to go to the bottom of the Doheny-Fall oil scandal bribery charges in the near future, after months of inactivity.

Counsel for Edward L. Doheny, his son, Edward L. Doheny, Jr., and Albert B. Fall are expected to decide this week their course in the face of the decision of the District of Columbia court of appeals which again opens the sensational case, in which the oil magnates and the former secretary of the interior are charged with bribery in connection with the leasing of the Elk Hills naval reserve in California.

The indictments grew out of the senate Teapot Dome investigation, in which Doheny admitted that his son carried \$100,000 to Washington in a little black satchel and gave it to Fall. Doheny insisted it was just a loan to an old friend.

The district court of appeals, in an opinion Monday by Chief Justice

George E. Martin, reversed the decision of the supreme court of the District of Columbia, which quashed indictments against Fall and the Dohenys and overruled a plea of abatement filed by the defendants. One of the indictments covered by the court's reversal charges Fall with receiving a bribe of \$100,000 to influence his official action regarding certain oil leases then pending before him. The other charges the Dohenys with giving the bribe.

NAZIMOVA REFUSES TO BE INTERVIEWED

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Mme. Alla Nazimova came back to her New York hotel and hid behind closed doors and avoided all who sought to inquire "as to her version of the latest bit of gossip in the theatrical world."

This gossip tells how Nazimova, who for 14 years had been known as the wife of Charles Bryant, her leading man, in reality through all those years was the legal wife of a Russian, and that she and Bryant never were married.

"Print anything you choose," was the word that Nazimova sent from her hotel room, when urged to comment. "I have nothing more to say."

DISARMAMENT IS KNOTTY PROBLEM

French and British Fail to Agree But Put Out Re-Assuring Note

GENEVA, Dec. 7.—(United News)—Arguments involving Great Britain's reversed navy temporarily dispipated the beatific atmosphere here from Locarno when the league of nations council convened for its final session of the year.

The council's disarmament commission returned to what the British term old fashioned, trench warfare, diplomacy when British and French arguments regarding disarmament ran afoul of each other. The commissioners notified the council that they had been unable to reach an agreement regarding the program for the proposed disarmament conference. Subsequently Paul Boncour, representing France, and Viscount Cecil of Chelwood, representing England, issued a reassuring joint statement.

Full agreement on eight of ten points had been reached, they announced. The points upon which agreement still is to be reached pertaining to the manner of linking security to disarmament.

"Disarmament," said Boncour,

which probably is the most important question before the world, never before has been taken up with such good will and with such chances for success."

CHRISTMAS RUSH HITS LOCAL P. O.

The "mail your Christmas packages early" campaign got over big in Klamath Falls, according to Postmaster John McCall. The heavy run on mailing of holiday packages started earlier this year than ever before.

Lines from 20 to 30 persons were filling to the mailing windows during the entire day Monday, entering into the spirit of "mail early."

According to Assistant Postmaster Griffith there will be more than 20,000 Christmas packages and parcels flooding the Klamath postoffice in outgoing mail.

"The foreign parcel mailing is practically over," said Griffith yesterday. "Mail for foreign dispatch leaves New York about December 15. Parcels for eastern distribution are now being sent on their way."

"I would estimate the number of parcels mailed from Klamath Falls as 20,000," said Griffith when questioned concerning the heavy mailing of the holiday season. "That means

an average of two parcels for every person in Klamath Falls.

"Mailing at this rate will increase steadily for the next two weeks, stacking up during the week of the 21st, when it would be practically impossible for any mail to be received at any point other than on the Pacific coast."

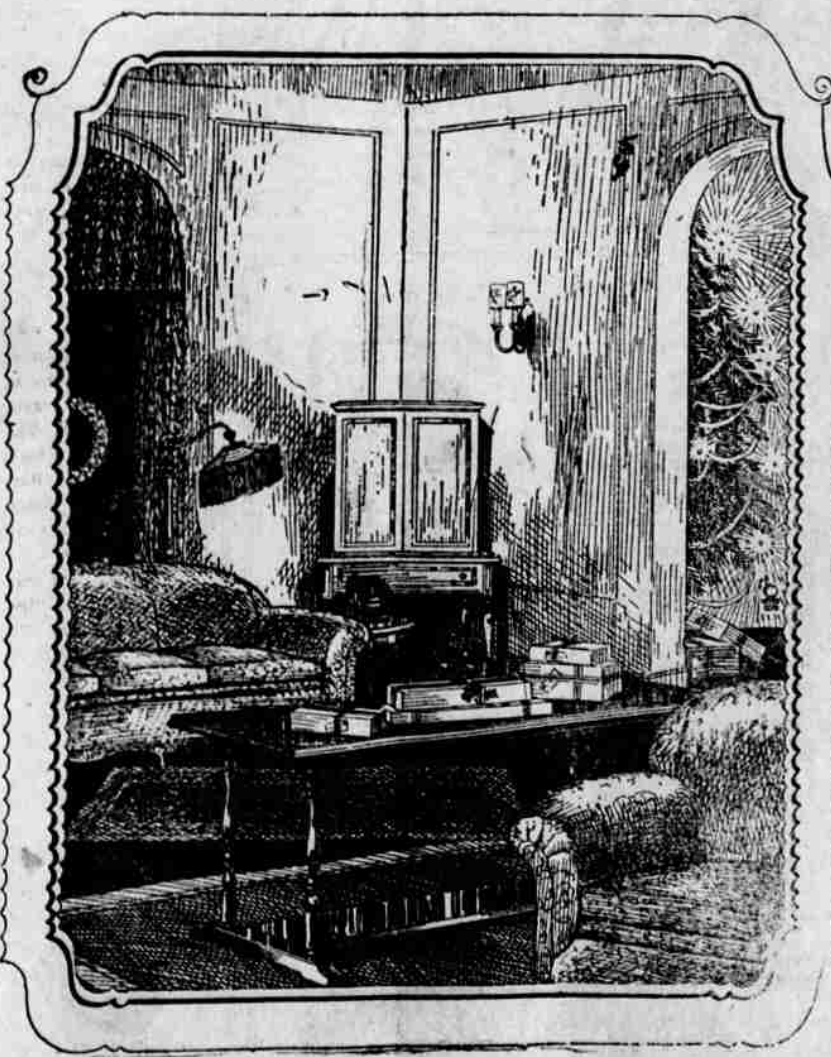
