The woman with the rather tired eyes and the gnarled hands who entered The News office yesterday, hadn't read Jane's letter which this newspaper shall forward to the children's saint. Somehow that kind of woman finds it unnecessary to see notes scrawled in the laborious manner which had engaged Jane.

" . . . for Jimmy, you see, hasn't any toys and he's only three years old," the letter from Jane continues. "I know he'd be so happy. . ."

There was nothing maudlin about the woman with the rather tired eyes and the gnarled hands. Probably there was sentiment involved—never sentimentality.

She didn't talk to the circulation manager, or the advertising manager, or the city editor. Straight to the publisher she went. Blantly, feigning a harshness which she seemed to feel might cover up some finer sense, she stated her case.

"I've got 50 cents," she told the editor. "Of course it's very little. But if you can use it for the kids' toy fund."

The editor thanked her; thanked her as he had several persons who, unwillingly to wait for the day when The News will ask for four-bit contributions, already had plunked down a half-dollar in the receptacle which, maybe, will provide happiness for a number of unfortunate Klamath Falls youngsters.

## Christmas Seal Sale Is Over Top

So enthusiastic are the school children of Klamath county in their campaign for ill-fated humanity that letters are arriving daily from rural districts asking that they be allowed double their quota of Christmas seals. The five city schools are doing equally well and expect to have all seals sold by December 17.

Miss Vera Houston reported today that returns from business houses and mills are beginning to come in. These groups were sent from one to five dollars' worth of the seals a week before the children were given their allotments. Thus the youngsters were working under a slight handicap, but one that they will easily overcome due to their great zeal.

The Oregon Tuberculosis association allows a certain percent of the proceeds to stay with the health departments of each county, according to a sliding scale which is decided by the number of stamps taken per person. Last year Klamath county averaged 7 stamps per capita and were hence entitled to 55 percent of the money realized.

from the sale. Mrs. G. A. Bellman, chairman of this year's drive feels that the proceeds will be even greater for 1925-1926. Although the seals are sold under the auspices of the Tuberculosis association the money is not used exclusively for members of society afflicted by this dreaded disease, but for other sufferers as well.

## SETTLERS GIVEN 40 YEARS TO PAY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(United News)—A bill providing a forty-year period for the repayment of charges by settlers on reclamation projects, was introduced in the senate today by Senator Wesley L. Jones of Washington, and by Representative John W. Summers of that state in the house.

This is the cure for delinquencies, and the ill which have come about by changed conditions. Summers said, particularly by changes in agriculture and the higher costs of reclamation. The bill provides for payment of one-fifth of the construction charge at the time of application no further payment for five years, and return of the balance in

35 equal installments over 40 years. Settlers on credit would be granted 40 years to pay.  
"Our bill," Summers bring relief to farmers and other projects, by giving 40 years to repay their loans, including a penalty accrued under the old law.
