### Local Matchmaker Picks Up Two Real Sluggers for The Next Card

# MAJOR LEAGUES SHOW JEALOUSY

NEW YORK, Dec. 9. — (United News)—The American league, sometimes referred to as the younger circuit, stepped out Wednesday at its annual winter meeting and told

its elder brother, the National league, just where to get off. In the first place, the American league magnates gave their president, Ban H. Johnson, a substantial vote of confidence. They not only extended Ban's term of office as president for five additional years, from 1930 to 1935, but they voted the genial rotund Chicagoan a raise in salary of \$10,000 a year. In some quarters, this is interpreted as a challenge to Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, who was brought in by the older circuit as the "czar" of baseball. The commissioner and Ban have been at odds for several years. Last year, it looked as though Johnson's rule in the American league was threatened. Now his colleagues have elected him to power for the next ten years, at a salary of \$40,000, while Judge Landis' contract expires in 1927. The American league owners also vetoed flatly a proposal by the National league to permit the pitchers to use resin to improve their grip on the ball next season. There will be no resin used in the younger league.
