Dozen Would Take On Rocky Kansas

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—(United News)—Now the wolves of the lightweight division howl on the trail of Rocky Kansas, and the battle-scarred little Italian, who unexpectedly achieved the crown he sought in vain for more than ten years, is the quarry of a dozen fighters.

Sid Terris, the flashy east side lightweight, who did not enter the tournament in which Jimmy Goodrich won the rather synthetic title, which passed on to Kansas in Buffalo Monday night, is the first to file a formal challenge with the New York boxing commission. Terris' challenge was approved by the commission and is on record, but this does not mean that Rocky must meet Sid immediately.

Kansas has six months, under the rules of New York state, to enjoy the fruits of victory. At the end of that time, he must meet a logical contender, or his title will be vacated.

PRINCE LEARNS SLANG

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Prince of Wales has added a new accomplishment to his repertoire of performances. On his first public appearance since returning from South America, Wales addressed the Argentine club at a dinner Thursday in his honor. He surprised his hosts with frequent interspersions of Argentine slang.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10.—S. C. Stone, charged with the murder of the Martin sisters, Nina and May, was found guilty by a jury late Thursday, which made no recommendations.

The verdict automatically sets the penalty at hanging. The jury was out five hours.

OAKLAND, Dec. 10.—K. O. Phil Kaplan of Newark, N. J., and Charley Long, negro, Omaha middleweight, have been signed for a 10 round bout at the Oakland auditorium next Wednesday.

BANDITS HOLD UP TROUTDALE BANK

PORTLAND, Dec. 10.—(United News)—Three youthful bandits held up the Bank of Troutdale, 12 miles east of here today and obtained \$400 in cash. They made their way back to Portland in an old automobile which they abandoned near the outskirts of the city.

Acting on a tip late Thursday night, deputy sheriffs raided the home of Vincent Murphy in Portland, where they arrested five men for investigation as suspects in the Troutdale bank robbery. These were Murphy, George Welsh, Charles Griffin, James Murray and Wallace Witzel. All but Griffin are said to have police or penitentiary records. They will be held until Friday morning, when the cashier, M. E. Boyd, will be asked to come to the county jail in an attempt to pick from a line-up of other prisoners and the suspects any one he might recognize as having been in the hold-up.

LIGHTED MATCH BLOWS UP STAGE

BEND, Dec. 10.—One match, lighted to determine how rapidly the tank of an automobile was filling, resulted in damage of approximately 4,000 to Frenchie's stage terminal station in Bend, and the partial destruction of a bakery delivery wagon in a fire here Thursday morning. Two men, Clarence Woods, driver of the delivery wagon, and Eddie Williamson escaped injury when the automobile tank and two filling tanks exploded. Woods lighted the match, holding it at a considerable distance from the tank. Frenchie is part owner of the Bend-Klamath Falls stage line.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS AGITATED OVER THE TURCO-BRITISH SPAT

GENEVA, Dec. 10.—(United News)—Sessions of the League of Nations council have been suspended to permit a final effort toward mutually acceptable settlement of the Turco-British dispute over Mosul. Meanwhile, the council is examining the possible courses open to it in the event Turkey attacks British forces in Mosul following a refusal to accept an arbitrary decision of the dispute.
