

HEAVIES ARRIVE FOR THURS. BOUT

Matchmaker Takes One Look Then Strengthens His Ring Supports

With the arrival tonight of Willie Keeler of Kellogg, Idaho, both of the heavyweights who will feature the boxing card at Scandia hall next Thursday night will be on the ground to show the fans their work in daily public workouts. Jack Mc Greer, Texas wild man, arrived late yesterday and pronounced himself as being fit for his 16-round scrap with the Idaho pugilist.

3 BODIES REMAIN IN ALABAMA MINE

Explosion Kills Over Fifty When Spark Lights Gas Filled Tunnels

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 11.—(United News)—The bodies of two white men and one missing negro were all that remained to be recovered Friday night from the Overton mine, where a gas explosion Thursday killed 52 or 53 men. Rescue workers were trying to rescue the two bodies, which were supposed to be buried beneath tons of debris.

Fifty bodies had been brought out of the mine and most of the rescuers were turning to the consolation of bereaved families.

Forty-three negroes had lost their lives and their families rent the air with frenzied cries of grief. The families of the dead white men wept beside them, and two or three families stayed to watch the mouth of the pit as nightfall came.

The cause of the explosion probably will not be determined. The witnesses to the cause, if any, are among the dead. The Overton is a gaseous mine and flame has always been forbidden in it. It is suggested that a miner may possibly have violated the rules and have set off

the gas when he attempted to sneak a smoke.

The theory that the men met death from suffocation by "after damp" which flooded the mine after the explosion, was strengthened as rescuers brought bodies to the surface. The condition of the bodies and their positions in the mine indicated suffocation, rescuers said.

The explosion was not severe enough to rock the hillside mining colony and even miners working in other slopes failed for a time to realize what had happened. Flames shot upward from the eighth or bottom entry, where the explosion occurred, and miners working nearby sped to safety. Other miners, seeing their fellow workers scampering to safety, did likewise and thus escaped death.

Officials reported Friday night that it would probably be "some time" before bodies of the two men buried under the earth and rocks could be recovered, and the exact death toll established at either 52 or 53.

Will the smaller minor league baseball leagues find a solution to their financial problems in cutting down their playing days to three a week—Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays?

Georg Texter, president of the Ohio and Pennsylvania league, just formed on a permanent basis in that section, believes it will. The Mid-Atlantic league tried out the idea last season, and found it a profitable move, compared to a daily schedule.

Such a schedule obviously eliminates the "week" days for crowds, Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. The latter day always has been a notoriously weak one, even in the big leagues, where "ladies days" have been instituted for that very reason.

The poor attendance is double ruinous to the small minor league teams because of the overhead in keeping a team quartered away from home on those days. These outfits have not the financial backing of the bigger organizations, and must depend upon the gate receipts for current expenses in the main.

The O.-P. league, under Texter's direction, will have to give the system a thorough tryout. The league will be an eight-club affair and play in the principal industrial centers of the two states, including Cleveland, Akron, Youngstown, Newcastle, Canton, Sharon, Erie and Massillon. At least five other clubs are anxious to join the organization under plan mapped out.

The O.-P. magnates are also leading a campaign to place the so-called "semi-pro" teams under the protection and supervision of the national association, to the end that the backers may be protected, the players receive a fair remuneration for players signed by the higher circuits and the circuits be cleansed of all taint of "outlawry."
