CHRISTMAS SEALS BRING HAPPINESS

Probably few people realize that the danger from tuberculosis is personal. Very few people stop to give the matter serious thought—yet it has to do with the most important problem which confronts humanity—the matter of the individual's own life.

Few people give serious thought to the conditions which make it necessary for them to risk their lives daily from contagion contracted from their fellows with whom they

come in contact. Have you thought about it in this way?

Have you realized that your neighbor who visits in your home may be a sufferer from this disease, and the germs left in your home may take hold of yourself or your children?

Have you, honestly, given the matter serious consideration?

Have you realized that the person who occupies a seat next to you in the theatre, or in the church, or at any public gathering may be a sufferer from tuberculosis, and that no one is aware of it—not even the victim himself?

This matter should be brought home to every individual. You know not, when you send your children to school, but that a tuberculous student may sit in the next seat, and from whom infection may enter your own home.

Everyone is in danger of tubercular contagion unless the disease is wiped out.

The greatest factor in minimizing the danger from the white plague is the constant attention of a nurse who devotes her whole time to inspection of the community in an effort to find out the cases existing in the community, secure treatment for them, and to prevent further contagion. This is being done in Klamath Falls and in Klamath county at present, but to assure a

continuance of this protection it is necessary for sufficient funds to be furnished to hire these nurses. And the only source of revenue for this work is in the sale of the "little life savers"—the Christmas seals.
