VET HOSPITAL IS ROCKED BY BLAST

SAN FERNANDO, Calif., Dec. 14.—Two men were seriously injured and 12 others slightly hurt when a mysterious blast rocked the U. S. Veterans' hospital, a new \$2,000,000 federal institution under construction here. A report to the sheriff's office in Los Angeles, indicated that a dynamite charge had been set off in one of the partially completed hospital units, but officials at the hospital would not confirm this. The building in which the explosion occurred was badly damaged. Two men were blown off their feet and painfully injured. Their names were not disclosed by the hospital officials. Twelve others, all working in the building at the time of the blast, were cut by flying glass and debris. A complete investigation of the explosion was ordered by the sheriff's office in Los Angeles.

Those guilty of violating the law by selling to persons who do not hold permits would be subject to a fine of \$1,000 and six months in jail on the first offense.
