

COUNT SALM HAS TOUGH SLEDDING

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—(United News)—Count Ludwig Salm von Hoogstraeten, the poor, but proud author of "How I Won the \$49,000,000 Standard Oil Heiress," has begun his last attempt to establish his authority.

As Millicent Rogers Salm, the count's wife, and the heroine of his literary effort, basked in her bathing suit on the warm sands of a Florida beach, the shivering Ludwig sent his lawyer to a New York court to file a suit for separation, and what is more important, for the custody of their son, little Pete.

This suit was in the nature of a clutch at a last straw on the part of the count, for, as he admits, he has tried in every possible way since his return to this country, to persuade his wife to rejoin him. Each comeback from Millicent was so frosty as to leave the nobleman's teeth chattering more violently than ever.

The count asserts in his original complaint, which he tried in vain to serve upon Millicent, that he first gave his wife permission to visit this country May 15, 1924, and that she never returned to Europe.

Millicent's millionaire father, H. H. Rogers, brought Millicent home at this time. Since then Salm asserts, she has refused to have anything further to do with him, so he bases the suit on a charge of abandonment.

California Fighter Is in Line For Title

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Babe Herman, speedy, hard hitting California featherweight, is a local favorite over Champion Lou (Kid) Kaplan of Connecticut for their 15 round title scrap at Madison Square Garden next Friday.

There are two reasons for this: first, the new rules that award a decision to the boxer winning the greater number of rounds; second, the difficulty Kaplan will have in making the weight.

Herman outpointed the champion throughout most of their recent bout at Waterbury, Conn., and it was only a "grand stand" finish which saved Kaplan his title. At that the judges' decision was at variance, with the opinion of most of the experts and fans.

The Californian is a flash from the first bell and is expected to pile up a lead in rounds which Kaplan can overcome only by a knockout. Barring such a contingency it will not be surprising if another ring title goes to the Pacific coast.

JOE GLICK WINS
NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The scheduled 12-round bout at the New Broadway arena Monday night between Joe Glick, Brooklyn, and Jose Lombardo, Panama, featherweights, ended in the sixth round, when the referee awarded the bout to Glick on a technical knockout.
