

### "Red" Grange May Be on Bench for Life

#### Injuries to Arm Believed to Be Serious, Would Not Go To Hospital

DANVILLE, Ill., Dec. 15.—"Red" Grange may be through. The famous Wheaton, Ill. ice man has entered a hospital here for repairs, giving rise to reports that the injury to his upper left arm is far more serious than he cares to admit.

Dr. E. B. Copley, father of the football star's assistant manager in his quest for gold in the field of professionalism, told the United News that he cannot yet determine the extent of "Red's" injuries.

"We will do everything possible to have him in shape for the trip south," said the physician. But if Grange's arm has not healed when his Chicago Bears start to Florida the latter part of this month, his career on the gridiron will be ended, for another year, at least. Whether his fame will be of any value to him by the time another football season rolls around is doubtful.

Since injuring his arm in the game at Pittsburgh last week, Grange has stayed with his team mates, sitting on the side lines and watching them lose to Detroit and to New York. These exposures haven't helped his sore arm any. It would have healed faster if Grange had been content to go to a hospital last week.

### French Girls Not Naughty; Extreme Styles in America

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 15.—(United News)—The popular belief that the words "French girl" and "naughty" are synonymous was exploded here Tuesday by Prof. Charles Centre, of the Paris Sorbonne.

"French girls," he said, "are very sensible and reasonable. I had to come to America to see the real extremes in dress. Such extremes are never seen in Paris except on a certain class of women."

"The American girls who wear their skirts up to their knees and even higher than that, and who wear a box of paint on each cheek aren't patterning after the chic French women. They merely are imitating the cheaper class."

Prof. Centre admitted that the girls of his country have been given more freedom since the war, but added that they have not allowed their individualism to run rampant. "Chaperones no longer are required for young persons at private parties," he said, "but no young woman of good standing would think of participating in a picnic in the country that was not chaperoned. The parents no longer choose the mates for their children, but the marriages are family affairs, discussed in a family conclave. Because of this there are fewer divorces in France."

### JAP TROOPS SENT INTO MANCHURIA

TOKIO, Dec. 15.—Japanese troops have been ordered to Manchuria to protect Japanese interests and citizens.

The cabinet announced its decision Tuesday to send a brigade of "supplemental" troops, numbering 2,500 men.

The war department said fighting was imminent in Manchuria, where the present garrisons are insufficient. The war area, the government announced, had extended to Mukden and Tieling.
