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## ANITA WHITNEY GETS RESPITE

### Prison Sentence Delayed As Supreme Court Tests California Law

WASHINGTON—Dec. 16—United Court today granted the petition News—The United States Supreme of Charlotte Anita Whitney, wealthy Oakland, Calif., social worker, for a rehearing of her conviction and prison sentence of from one to fourteen years in prison for violation of the California criminal syndicalism law.

The case was set for hearing March 15th.

The club woman's prison sentence was delayed pending the ruling on this motion which followed the supreme court's action in dismissing her first appeal from the conviction.

### No Specific Ruling

The court's first action did not rule specifically on the constitutionality of the California law, which makes mere membership in an organization devoted to overthrow of the existing government through violence, a felony. In her appeal, Miss Whitney argued that a federal question of constitutionality was involved, demanding a court ruling on the law.

## FRENCH PLANES DROP SHELLS IN DAMASCUS

JERUSALEM, Dec. 16.—United News—French airplanes, artillery and machine guns bombarded Damascus Tuesday night, according to the Jewish telegraph agency.

The bombardment followed a day of fierce fighting during which the French tried to repel a Druze invasion of the city. Many casualties are reported on both sides.

Druze rebels entered the city in the morning and were driven off after fighting, but they returned in the evening and engaged the French in a sharp battle.

Damage to the city was considerable, especially in the Shagar quarter, which suffered severely from French shells and bombs.
