MEXICAN EXTOLLS U. S. AS A LEADER

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—(United News)—The "imperialism" and industrialism of the United States was depicted before the smaller nations of the western hemisphere by Jose Miguel Bejarano, Mexican commissioner of agricultural and colonization, in an address to the Pan-American commercial congress.

The United States, Bejarano said, had become supreme among the five groups of empires which dominated the earth, the American, British, Far Eastern, Russian and French.

By treaties, by wars and by purchase, he said, the United States has become the great nation that it is today. It is the business empire of the western hemisphere. Actual acquisition of territory has now ceased, but the great war, marking the hegemony of this nation in the world, marked also the flourishing of its virtual economic control of the western hemisphere.

PUBLIC WILL GET STILLMAN TRIAL

Famous Case May Again Be Dragged Through the Divorce Court

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—The famous Stillman case is to be fought out again.

Mrs. Anne Stillman has begun action against her husband, James Stillman, former president of the National City bank, for divorce. Her attorney Isaac Mills, who represented Leonard Kip Rhineland in the latter's annulment suit, has declared in favor of jury trial.

This time it is Mrs. Stillman who is asking a divorce, and her attorney has declared in favor of an open trial. Summons and complaint were served on Stillman this week and the former banker is given until Dec. 28 to answer.

"The last proceeding before a referee took two years," said former Judge Mills. "It might be better to throw the matter out in court, and have true accounts in the newspapers as we did in the Rhineland case."

Mrs. Stillman is at present receiving \$90,000 annual alimony from her husband but recently indicated she was disposed to sue for divorce, trusting to admissions made by the banker of his misconduct case with Florence Leads to win her.

DAYLIGHT RAID NETS \$10,000 IN LIQUORS

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 17.—A broad daylight raid on the county dry squad's contraband stronghold netted hijackers \$10,000 worth of choice liquors, it was learned here Thursday.

The raid occurred Saturday under the very nose of James Bond, chief of the squad, it was said.

A similar raid on the government warehouse at San Pedro several days ago netted hijackers liquors valued at \$50,000.

Meningitis Scare Practically Over

Klamath Falls' spinal meningitis scare seems to be a thing of the past.

Once again the county health unit announced last night that no additional cases of the disease had been reported.

Officials held that the situation here is excellent. They are of the opinion that the so-called epidemic has run its course.

At present, it was said, there are three cases in the county. Two persons have died from the disease.

AGAINST PLEBISCITE

ARICA, Chile, Dec. 18.—Chile is carrying out her threat against the plebiscite commission.

Augustin Edwards, the principal of the Chilean delegation, and his chief adviser, Nélson Foster, announced Friday they would depart immediately for Santiago. Some time ago it was intimated that Chile would participate only in such plebiscitary activities as were designed directly in the vote. Some members of the Chilean delegation are remaining for this purpose.

SENEGAL FIGHTER INSPIRES BLACKS

FLUSHING, N. Y., Dec. 18.—(United News)—Around a sorry sort of grave for one who had lived as vividly as "Battling Siki," a handful of negroes gathered Friday afternoon to bury Louis Phal.

Louis, who came out of Senegal as a slave, and rose to be light heavyweight champion, to die by the bullets of a vengeful bootlegger, was buried without the pomp and ceremony he loved during his lifetime. Yet, around the little funeral parlor on the upper west side, in which the services were held, a throng of nearly 2,000 negroes crowded and fought for vantage points and heard a preacher declare that "no man who ever came out of the jungles had any more dramatic life or a more tragic career."

Siki was charged with the energy of a Greek mythological god, the preacher declared. The boxer, whose name was Louis Phal, when he first was taken from the jungle of Senegal to be a servant in a French household, and serve with distinction in the World war, was murdered early Tuesday.

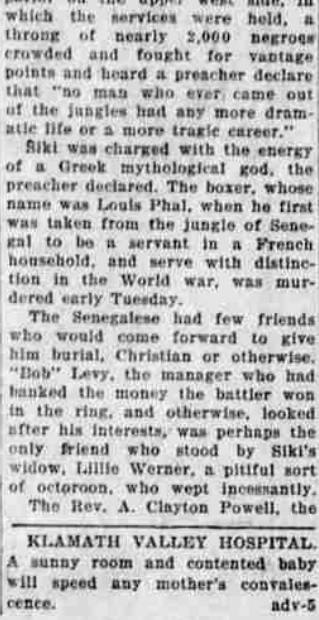
The Senegalese had few friends who would come forward to give him burial, Christian or otherwise. "Bob" Levy, the manager who had banked the money the battler won in the ring, and otherwise, looked after his interests, was perhaps the only friend who stood by Siki's widow, Lillie Werner, a pitiful sort of octoroon, who wept incessantly.

The Rev. A. Clayton Powell, the

preacher who officiated at Siki's funeral services, declared the black boxer "a victim of civilization." He said Siki had been permitted to "run wild," and hence had come to grief. Into the little funeral chapel crowded 75 negroes and half a dozen white folks. Ten Mohammedans were in the group. Siki's wife had insisted upon a Christian burial.

TARIFF ON SHINGLES
OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 18.—A resolution memorializing to enact tariff legislation placing a duty on the importation of shingles into the United States was filed in the house of the Washington legislature today by Representative Templeton, Snohomish county. The resolution said approximately 10,000 loggers and shingle mill workers are out of employment at least two-thirds of the time, due to the importation of duty free shingles from Canada.
