

STRAIGHT TIPS TO WINTER DRIVERS

With the tremendous increase in the number of closed cars sold and the nation-wide good roads development, winter driving in all climates is more universal today than ever before in the history of the motor car.

It is at this time of the year that it behooves every motorist to make those preparations for winter driving which afford more comfort and eliminate the wear on the car incident to cold weather and even the repairs which will be necessary if they are neglected.

It will repay the motorist many times over to drive to the service station conducted by the concern which sold the car and have an inspection made, as each individual car is likely to present a different problem.

There is, however, a general procedure which covers preparation of all cars for winter driving.

In the first place, both cooling system and battery should be prepared for freezing weather. In the case of the cooling system, all connections on the radiator should be tightened before placing anti-freeze solutions, either glycerine or alcohol in the car. When alcohol is used, the solution should be added from time to time, as alcohol evaporates but when a glycerine solution is used no further attention is required for the remainder of the winter with full safety.

The battery should be inspected regularly every two weeks and if found below full charge, should be re-charged. A low battery quickly freezes.

Have battery terminals and all wiring inspected. Every terminal should be clean and tight to permit the full flow of current.

A cold engine always is slow to start, and everything should be done to make starting easy. The motor should be tuned, and if found necessary, the carbon removed and valves ground. The choke and carburetor should be thoroughly inspected, spark plugs and distributor breaker points cleaned and adjusted and when necessary, replaced with new ones.

The crankcase, rear axle and transmission lubricants should be replaced with winter grade oil and grease. These winter grades are lighter and will not congeal so readily in cold weather. Have all nuts and bolts tightened and the chassis thoroughly lubricated to prevent rust from forming.

Winter Starting.
Always push out clutch before starting engine; use the choke intelligently so as not to flood cylinders with raw gasoline; let the engine run a short time before starting the car, and do not attempt to drive fast until the engine is warm. Change crank case oil at least once every 500 miles. It is advisable to watch oil closely during the winter as excessive use of choke is likely to cause considerable dilution.

There is an advantage in the use of a radiator shutter. This permits a leaner carburetor adjustment, and decreases the crank case oil dilution by approximating summer temperature conditions in the engine.

To provide future comfort to occupants the hood louvers may be closed by strip of card board which forces warm air from the engine through the floor boards.

The following of all these suggestions is not expensive and will prove economical through greater comfort, less wear and tear on the car, and a saving of gasoline.

OVERLAND ENJOY GREATEST SALES

With 1925 shipments up to December 9 showing an increase of more than 50,000 cars over the period from January 1 to December 9 of 1924, Willys-Overland is enjoying its greatest sales volume.

Not only has the shipment record to date this year beaten that of 1924, but it also is approximately 3,000 automobiles ahead of the shipping record for the same period of 1923, the best year in the history of Willys-Overland. Production for this period in 1923 totalled 194,364 Overlands and Willys-Knights.

Coincident with the unusual activity marking shipment records at Willys-Overland is the fact that twice during the fall months boat shipments on the Great Lakes established new shipping marks for this type of freight, while several trainloads to such points as Chicago, Decatur and the two southern points, Miami and Memphis, have further contributed to Willys-Overland's unusual shipment records. In addition, an extraordinary shipment activity has marked the endurance of the Willys Derby, national sales contest in which more than 10,000 members of Willys-Overland's field organization were entered. This contest closed on November 30, but the factory has noted an urgent Christmas demand among prospective owners and dealers which is reflecting itself in the dearth of orders now on hand.

Higher-Ups Face Prison Sentence For Whisky Deal

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 19.—(United Press.)—Michael Kinney, Missouri state senator, Arnold Helmich, former internal revenue collector at St. Louis, and twenty-one others face prison sentences and heavy fines for conspiring to violate the Volstead act.

Verdicts of guilty were returned in federal court here late Friday against the 27 persons named originally in the plot to substitute water for the whisky that was withdrawn from the stocks of the old Jack Daniel distillery.

Judge Baltzell announced he would pass sentences December 30. The heaviest penalty under the law is two years in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

The story of how thousands of barrels of whisky found their way into the channels of the bootleg industry in the Middle West created an official upheaval comparable with the famous Hayner case.

DEMOCRAT TAKES ISSUE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—President Coolidge's economy claims were subjected to a searching analysis in the house today by Representative J. W. Byrnes, democrat, Tennessee, and rejected as deceptive.

"Carefully planned propaganda has led the country to believe that federal expenditures were being mightily retrenched, but as a matter of fact they have been largely increased," Byrnes said.

CHRYSLER HELPS NEWSPAPER MEN

Block that kick!

Being good football men as well as good newspaper men, Hinky Horn, sporting editor of the Nashville (Tennessee) Tennessean, and C. J. Burnell, staff photographer of the same paper, knew that to go to press with the story of the Vanderbilt-Auburn football game without photographs would cause a howl from their football fans that could be heard to the farthest corner of the composing room.

So, for 225 miles, up half the state of Alabama and across more than half the state of Tennessee they raced against time in a Chrysler Six Phaeton. Leaving the stadium in Birmingham, Alabama, at 3:12 in the afternoon, they were in Nashville at 9:06 in the evening with photographs of the 10 to 9 Auburn victory.

The driving was done by Paul Cecil, of the Hermitage Motor Car Co., Nashville Chrysler distributors, and the actual running time was only five hours and twenty-one minutes. Although they made only 32 miles the first hour out from Birmingham, due to the deplorable condition of a long detour, they made up for it once they hit better roads. They made the distance from Columbia to Franklin, 28 miles, in 28 minutes, and from Franklin to the city limits of Nashville, 18 miles in 19 minutes.

All Wizard Foot Ball Teams Picked

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Now that All-America teams, All-Eastern teams, All-Conference teams and All-Colored teams for 1925 have been picked by everyone including the janitor, the janitor's boy and Natalie Crane, it's about time to admit that it's a futile practice at best.

No one is qualified to select an All-American team of his own, because no one can watch more than one game each Saturday during the season, nor see more than eight or nine games at the most. If a selection must be made—although there are a lot of coaches who would gladly see it abolished—one must accept the opinion of others. And so any authoritative All-America becomes a consensus All-America.

The late Walter Camp recognized this in recent years. Fifteen or twenty seasons ago he used to get away with it by picking six Yale men, three Harvard players, one from Princeton, and then create a sensation and an air of authority by tacking into his lineup some such player as Hooziz of Bucknell.

Nowadays, with star players scattered from coast to coast and border to border, it is impossible to grade them so accurately as to name the eleven best.

Taken in conjunction with this business of "pro" football, the practice of picking All-America teams is a deterrent to team play and a bad thing for a game which is so dependent upon team play for its real charm.

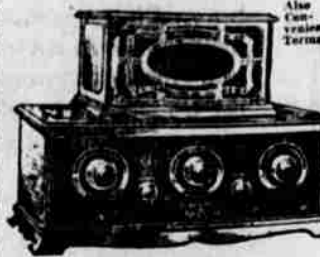
