DALLES MYSTERY TURNS OUT TAME

THE DALLES (Ore.), Dec. 19.—(United Press.)—Rumors that a woman's arm and an abandoned car had been found on the old Snipe's tract, west of this city were circulated freely late yesterday evening, until examination by Doctors Morse and Hamilton showed the dismembered bones to be the forearm of an ape or baboon. The skeleton parts were unearthed by a puppy and consisted of radius bone, to which had been attached bones curiously resembling those of a human being.

The fingers were as large as those of a large man, although the palm was only half as wide, and the radius bone was much shorter.

The theory advanced was that an ape or chimpanzee escaped from the old fair grounds near the Snipe's tract years ago, and was killed or died from exposure. Dr. Hamilton expects to send the bones to Dr. John D. Horner, Oregon Agricultural college or to the University of California for complete classification.

Express Embargo Cripples Florida

TAMPA, (Fla.), Dec. 19.—(United Press.)—Signs urging shoppers to "send a box of fruit to the folks back home for Christmas," were taken down by fruit dealers Friday and residents began to see visions of a Christmas without gifts from their relatives and friends in other states as a result of the drastic express embargo announced Thursday. Fruit dealers specializing in shipping Christmas boxes, hardest hit by the embargo on outland express, were forced to turn away thousands of dollars of business Friday, while inbound Christmas traffic in packages was standstill.

The embargo bans exports of citrus fruit, fish, and other products out of the state and imports of every nature, exceptable foods, drugs, medicine and funeral supplies.
