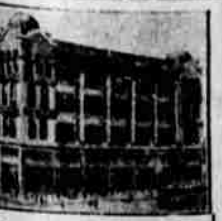

**WELLESLEY, Mass.**, Dec. 21.—The girl of the south and the girl of the north still have their differences as to how one should play.

And the line of demarcation between those from the north and those from the south never flashed more brightly than it did at Wellesley college during the annual conference of the Women's Intercollegiate association for student government.

For instance, the pride of Dixie clings to the now "antiquated chaperon," scorns "the smokes," and would not tolerate the same privileges the college man enjoys.

But not so with the eastern girl. She wants to go places without a chaperon, stay just as late as brother does, and return with "no questions asked."

The eastern one says she does not care to break college rules, but admits she is for "freedom." As one eastern delegate put it, the college woman is a responsible being, and should be capable of deciding between right and wrong.

**INDIANS LOSE PLEA FOR TIMBER LAND**

**PORTLAND**, Dec. 21.—Five Klamath Indians, attempting to obtain certain land tracts in the Klamath reservation, lost the first round of their contest when Fed-

eral Judge Bean sustained the government's demurrer to their complaint.

The decision affecting cases of Maggie J. Dall, Rosetta Crawford, Cora M. Crystal, Melvon M. Eagle and Ora M. Eagle, also is expected to have a bearing on seven other such cases now pending.

According to Assistant United States Attorney McGilchrist, the Indians petitioned for valuable timber allotments on the reservation. This was denied, he said, because the timbered property was held to be of more value to the Klamath tribe as a whole than to the individuals. He also declared that the original allotment act of congress allowed reservation Indians grazing and agricultural tracts, but not timbered areas.
