### DEMOCRATS MAKE VALIANT STRIDES FOR WORLD COURT

#### Wilson Followers Back Up Administration Plan To Adopt League

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Democrats can hardly find time to do Christmas chores they are so busy helping President Coolidge drag the stubborn irreconcilable Republicans within flirting range of the League of Nations. Take Tuesday, for instance. Within a few minutes after the White House spokesman had told the newspapers that the government is working on a method to pursue in accepting the invitation to the league's preliminary armament conferences. Democrats had turned in resolutions in the house and senate designed to help along this enterprise.

Senator King of Utah offered a resolution authorizing the president to appoint representatives to any armament conference called by the League of Nations. Representative Moore of Virginia submitted a resolution requesting the president to accept the league's invitation to participate in the preparatory commission.

**Democrats Gleeful.**  
Pro-league Democrats are scarcely able to restrain their glee over the shift which is in process in the American foreign policy. Their worst fear is that in some unguarded

moment during debate, one of them let slip something about the administration appropriating the Wilson policies one by one. They want to save that boast until the next political campaign. Also they do not want to frighten the Republicans off just as they are venturing up for a nibble. For the first time since 1918 many Democrats feel Woodrow Wilson and the League of Nations may yet become political assets.

If all goes as Coolidge is hoping the Democrats at the next national convention will cringe at the mention of the Wilson peace policies as they did at Madison Square Garden. What they are doing now is to help the administration into the world court, the league conference and other European participation that appears feasible.

All of this is registering in the glowering irreconcilables who are finding the president harder to mould than petrified Vermont marble. One of the foremost of them told the United News Tuesday not to be too sure about the president going into the Geneva conference.

"He's going in if he can work out a plan," this eminent senator said. "But I have my doubts whether he will be able to work one out."

Despite this senator's confidence that the United States will not participate the general impression here is to the contrary.

#### ENTER TIENSIN.

LONDON, Dec. 22.—(United News)—General Feng Yu Hsiang's troops have entered Tientsin, according to a dispatch from Peking to the Daily Express.

Feng's army entered the city from the south after cutting the railway line between Peking and Nanking.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 22.—(United News)—Mayor Kendrick late Tuesday ordered Brigadier General Smedley Butler to vacate his office as director of public safety tomorrow and Butler at once refused.

"I am aware of no reason why I should resign or vacate the office," Butler replied to the mayor's demand.
