fascists. The fascist prestige was enhanced accordingly.

At the central fascist headquarters in Paris, the leaders are eager to state their case. In such a mood was Valois.

"We hope the government does declare war upon us," he said. "Sooner or later we will declare war upon the actual rulers of France. Our task is to rid France of the meaningless parliament which now rules our land, and establish a dictatorial government which would possess an iron hand in a velvet glove. France needs a dictator to bring her through her present crisis. Government by party is an obsolete method which shows itself incapable of unison in the interests of all the people. Why should France be deluded by the defeatists of 1914 and 1918.

"Fascism, while supporting a policy of firmness, is based on fairness. We oppose such rule as that of the Poincare ministry which upset the quiet of Europe, and we see France establish more friendly relations with Germany and her other former enemies.

"As regards her war debts, France must pay them to maintain her financial reputation. Since these debts must be paid, negotiations should be concluded as rapidly as possible with both America and Great Britain."

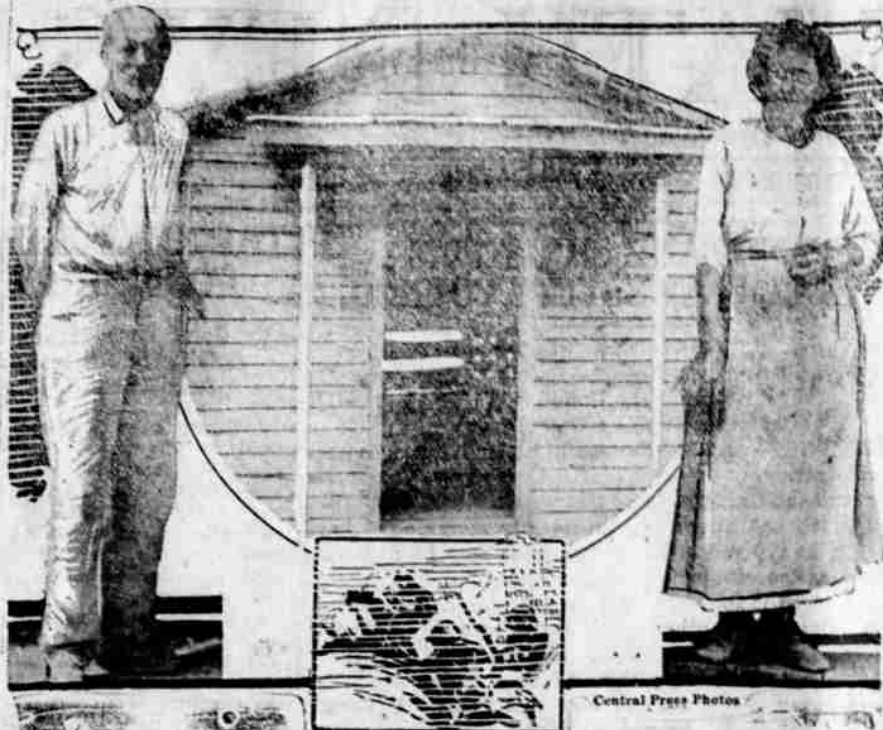

## COUNTY CLUB BOY HAS RECORD CALF

If a lot of stock men would take lessons from Frank H. McCornack, Jr., local boy and county club worker, there would be a whole lot less complaint of bad markets and ruinous prices among livestock raisers, according to C. A. Pauley, Klamath meat market man.

Last September at the county fair Pauley bid in young McCornack's calf which was then six months old and weighed 650 pounds. The price was 11 cents per pound, making \$74.50. It was a real calf then Pauley stated.

The Klamath butcher did not need the calf then, but had visions of some real blue ribbon Christmas beef, so he made the club boy a proposition to continue feeding the calf until the week before the holidays for a further consideration of 11 cents per pound for whatever gain the boy could get in the animal's weight.

A few days ago the calf, then ten months old, was killed, weighing 820 pounds and dressing out better than 59 per cent, which beef men know to be a remarkable record. The boy got a 140-pound gain at 11 cents, or \$15.40 more, making a total of \$90.20 for one short yearling.

The carcass is on exhibition at the Sanitary market and will be cut up and sold shortly after Christmas, Pauley said. Expert beef judges say the McCornack calf will compare with big stock show prize winners.

## U. S. ASKS CHECK

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 23.—The federal government, fearful that its road aid money suffered the same misuse as the funds of the state, has ordered an accounting of its revolving fund.

In a letter to Attorney General Dan Moody Wednesday, United States Comptroller General McCarl declared that there "should be rendered to the United States, an immediate report and accounting of the transaction which has resulted in the recovery of \$600,000, so that there may be determined and returned to the United States all of its moneys involved."

## COLD IN SOUTH

TAMPA, Fla., Dec. 23.—(United News)—A cold wave was sweeping toward Florida Tuesday night, just 19 years since the southern part of the state had its last snow.

Frost in the southern section is not expected to damage the fruit crop to any great extent, the weather bureau said.
